So Argues Guy Pratt of the Telephone Company.

BETTER SERVICE FOUND HERE

In Countries Under Government Ownership 'Phone Service is Not Operated Nights, Sundays. or Helidays.

Government ownership of telephones was argued against at noon before the Rotary club by Guy Pratt, general superintendent of the commercial department of the Bell telephone interests in Nebraska.

"Service before low price," he urged, and said that according to the history and present condition under government ownership of 'phones in Europe, neither of those necessary characteristics of tele hone service had been attained there. Nine and one-tenth telephones are in use in the United States for every 100 of population, he asserted. As compared with that he cited the figures for various countries of Europe, where the 'phone systems are owned and operated by the government. Austria has one-half, France, seven-tenths; Belgium, eighttenths and Great Britain, one and sixtenths 'phones for every 100 of popula-

Most of the phone exchanges are close abroad at night and on Sundays and holidays, under government ownership, he said, and the service there under that system therefore cannot be compared to American phone service.

Over \$16,000,000 is paid in taxes yearly by American phone companies, he asserted, and that sum would have to be people, if the United States government should take over the phone companies.


