Then the world must turn away from Bernhard Shaw, Ibsen, Strindberg, Maeterlinck Nietzsche. It must reject Mrs. Gilman's cold, maternal disdain of motherhood this furious afraidness of the stork, so haracteristic decadent elements of Amer ican life today. It will have to refuse also, Ellen Key's and Margaret Deland's hot unbridling of the love passion under the false plea of an anarchical idealism which is nothing but the flesh delfied. The Gothe, Wagner, Nietzsche worldview must go! Eugenics, that would-be science of good mating and good birth, will never be a practical science for a einful humanity, till it takes Christianity and the Christian conscience as its religious and ethical motive. In the degree that pastors are the eu-

genists of Christian faith, they become the most influential promoters of whatever sound augenic laws and principles the state may come to adopt for its ex-ternal life. The gospel is, after all, whatever the eneers at "orthodoxy," the incomparable eugenic force, just because it is not mere law, not even "the second law," as legalistic religion would have it, but "the power of God" through fait. That power intelligently and profoundly applied to life is life's supreme eugenics, the eugenics of the Christian conscience.
