
Forest Fire Prevention.

The San Francisco Call says the California state forester has evolved a plan to prevent the recurrence of such disastrous fires as recently raged over the picturesque Mount Tamalpais, menacing adjacent settlements. He proposes to organize a corps of motorcycle forest fire patrolmen, more to prevent than fight fires. These men, who are to be trained foresters, he would assign to

fire patrol beats as policemen in cities, and let each man stand as the guardian against destruction. The state and county might share the expense, but that is a more matter of detail.

Such a plan should commend itself wherever forests are subject to the ravages of fire. Something of the sort is done in certain countries of Europe, where valuable and scenic forests are not devastated as in
