

WHOLEWHEAT FINISH BEATS DENVER TEAM

Rourke Comes in from Behind with a Rush and Annex Hard-Fought Game.

KANE STARTS THE SLAUGHTER
His Three-Sacker is the Undoing of Barney Schreiber.

ROBINSON IS DRIVEN OUT
Applegate Then Holds the Grizzlies Scoreless for a Time.

SHESTAK THEN BATS FOR HIM
Stevens Takes Applegate's Place and Gets Credit for Winning the Game Which Barring Rally Puts on Ice.

After trailing the Grizzlies all the way up to the eighth inning Pa Rourke's tribe rallied and pounded Barney Schreiber to all parts of the park and with the assistance of a couple of errors on Denver's part drove in six tallies, winning the second game of the series by a score of 7 to 0.

The Rourkees had little trouble finding Schreiber at any stage of the game, but when a hit was needed to push a run across, the Denver hurler tightened and on the first six hits Omaha made, but one run was the result. In the eighth Kane broke Barney's nerve when he slammed the first ball to the left field boards for three bags. An error and two more hits came in a row and the Denver team availed.

Denver had no license to win the game, getting but five hits all through, but rank decisions by Umpire Anderson helped things materially. The entire Denver team sat in front of their dugout and coached the runners and batters at will. Anderson never attempted to stop them until the eighth inning.

Quillin Piles from Danger.
Lee Quillin added more glory to his already dirty ball playing record in the eighth inning. Omaha had tied the score and Schipke was on the corner sack when Coyle lifted a long sacrifice fly to Channell. Quillin grabbed Schipke about the waist and held him in an attempt to keep the Rourkees playing from scoring. Kane, who was coaching at third, ran up to Quillin ready for fight, but the third sacker cut his dirty work when he saw danger ahead. Schipke managed to score all right, no thanks to Quillin.

Omaha used three pitchers during the game. Robinson lasted part of the first inning and with one run across, the bases full and none out, he was jerked and Applegate brought in to replace him. Applegate pulled the team out of the hole without allowing another score. He did not give a hit until the sixth inning, when Denver copped a couple of safe ones, and with the aid of a walk and a sacrifice hit, scored three runs. In this inning he was retired to let Shestak bat for him. Stevens finished the game and gave but two hits and was never in danger, and is credited with the victory.

Denver Scores First.
Denver started the scoring machine in the opening inning. Quillin walked and went to third on Cassidy's double. Channell was hit by a pitched ball, filling the bases. Butcher stroled, forcing Quillin home. Applegate here entered the game and Elston batted into a double.

Omaha evened up in the third. Schipke singled to center and Applegate sacrificed him to second. Justice's double to left scored the Skipper.

In the visitor's sixth, Quillin was safe on Grubb's error. Cassidy walked and Channell sacrificed. Butcher's triple to the centerfield wall sent Quillin and Cassidy over. Butcher scored on Elston's single.

Kane Starts Rally.
Kane started the rally for Omaha with a triple in the eighth. Johnson was safe on Coffey's error and Kane registered. Grubb sent one too hot for Schreiber to handle. Schipke singled to center and Johnson scored. Stevens got to second on Schipke to third and Grubb home on Schreiber's wild heave to catch Grubb at third. 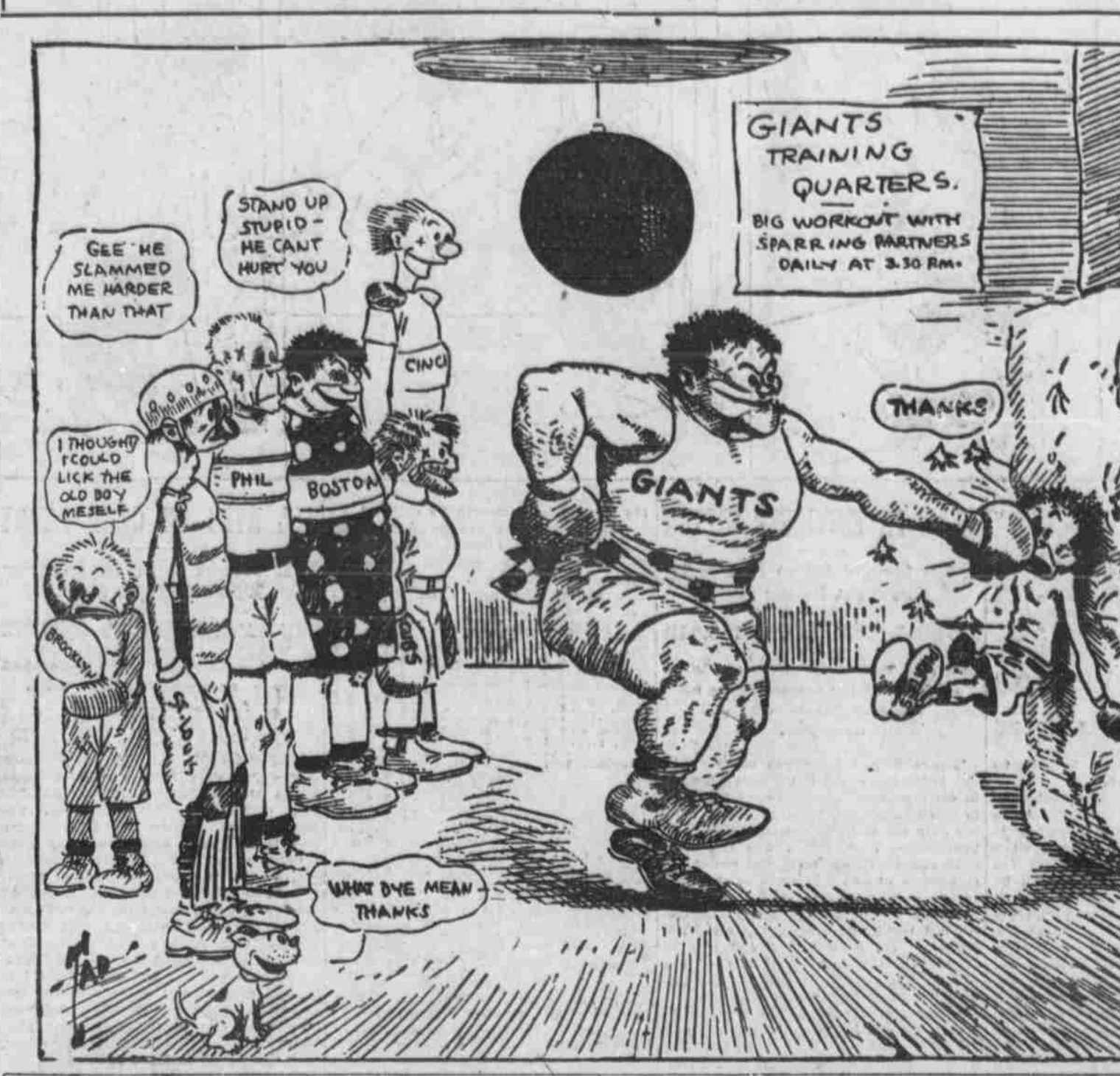

CINCINNATI, Aug. 9.—An avalanche of hits in the second and third innings, combined with errors by Berghammer in the latter inning, gave New York more than enough runs to win the third game of the series from Cincinnati today. The score was 11 to 2. Packard started the game for Cincinnati, but was knocked out of the rubber in the third inning. Herbert succeeded him.
