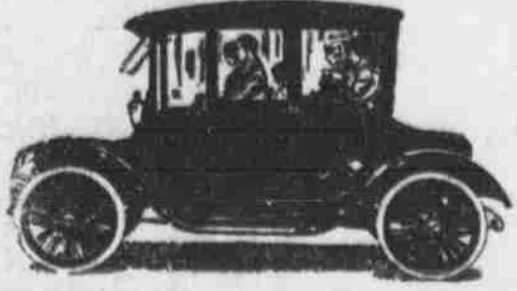

Mrs. Christopher Durr, Omaha Pioneer, Dies

Mrs. Christopher Durr, 80 years of age, died Monday evening at the family residence, 2027 South Eighth street. For the last six years Mrs. Durr's health had been failing and since the first of the month she had been confined to her bed. She came to Omaha forty-five years ago from Cincinnati, O., and was among the pioneers who saw what was then a frontier village grow into one of the cities of the west. Surviving her besides her husband, Christopher, who has been associated for a good many years with the Union Pacific railroad, are six children, E. C. Durr, 461 California street; Mrs. C. H. James, Chicago; Miss Mary Christopher, jr.; Miss Agnes and Allen, all still living at home. The funeral will take place from the residence at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, with services at St. Patrick's church, Fourteenth and Castellor streets, at 9 o'clock. Interment will be at Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

SITUATION BETWEEN TURKS AND BULGARS IS CRITICAL

LONDON, Aug. 18.—The situation between Bulgaria and Turkey is becoming critical. Prince Ferdinand, the Turkish grand vizier, admits that the Turks have occupied Demotica, twenty-five miles south of Adrianople, and other strategic points on the right bank of the Maritza river; but he explains this was done only for the protection of the railway which runs along the stream. Said Halim denied that the Turks have occupied Dodegatch, the terminus of the railroad on the Gulf of Enez, or that they are advancing on Gumuljak, to the northwest. The Porte clearly has not the slightest intention of abandoning Adrianople, where Enver Bey has an army of 20,000 troops, which soon will be increased to 40,000.

A bystander who saw him fall pulled Mr. Shonts from between the wheels just in time to save the New Yorker from being run over. As it was Mr. Shonts' hands and legs were badly cut, but tonight he appeared to be little the worse for his misadventure. When the accident occurred the train was stopped and Mrs. A. P. Moore (Lillian Russell, the American actress, who was a passenger and had a first aid outfit with her, alighted and bandaged up Mr. Shonts' hurts.

City Council to Meet Wednesday to Pass Levy Ordinance.

GRADING CONTRACTS ARE LET

Bohemian Catholic Turners to Hold Convention Latter Part of Month—Chauffeur Finds Man Who Wouldn't Pay.

In order to come within the time limit set by the city charter the city council will meet Wednesday evening for the purpose of passing the levy ordinance. Mayor Hector, City Attorney Murphy, City Clerk Perry Wheeler and the council worked on the ordinance yesterday evening, but failed to complete their work in time for the council meeting to act on it. The principal work of last night's session was getting out the bids and approving the bonds of the successful contractors for improvements in different parts of the city. Grading district 129 was let to Ed Carr at a price of 11 1/2 cents per cubic yard. Carr also won grading district 120 at 14 1/2-19 cents. Chris Hugh got grading district 120 at 20 cents a yard and Dan Hannon grading district 127 at 23 1/2 cents a yard. An ordinance covering the work of the new building and sewer inspector was put on first reading and referred to the judiciary committee. John Trainor is to be appointed to this place it is understood.

City Clerk Wheeler's annual report was presented and filed. The report of the clerk was clear and covered every item of expense that passed through his official hands. The completeness and intelligibility of the report was commented on by all who inspected it. Upon motion of Councilman Henry Hartnett of the Seventh ward and unanimously endorsed by the rest of the council the salary of Miss Isabelle Fishery, stenographer to the city attorney's office, was raised to \$75 a month. The resolution of Councilman Hartnett recited the fact that the work of the city attorney's office was increasing and that the bond ordinances and ordinances from other departments of the city were being drawn by the city attorney's stenographer. City Attorney Murphy stated that he was pleased with the action of the council in taking notice of the increased work and responsibility of his office.

R. C. Beavers asked that the city make good a loss of \$28 sustained by him when his auto was struck by the city's street sweeper a week ago. A number of motions to place electric lights at different sections of the city were passed by the council. Councilman Riha asked that the sanitary inspector investigate the complaints of the residents living in the neighborhood of fire hall No. 2, which is said to be the cause of unhealthy odors.
