Wood Economically Sawed With a Motor

This portable electric equipment is owned by a wood dealer who receives his wood in railway cars and delivers it by cart in small lots. A portion of the carload which is shipped in long lengths is cut up as unloaded and piled into the cart for immediate delivery to his customers.

The saw and motor occupy a space 3x6 feet. The motor is direct connected to the saw so there is no waste power. WOMAN TURNS ELECTRIC CAR INTO MONEY MAKER



WOOLWORTH CHIMES ARE RUNG BY ELECTRICITY

Among the many unique and pleasing features which make the Woolworth building more than a massive pile of architecture with a claim to interest only on account of its sheer size are the elecbe the watchward of all pleasure "trip- trically operated bells and chimes found in the "rathskeller" of the building. The temple bell outfit consists of twenty resonator bells ranging in chromatic intervals from low C to high G. The bells are mounted upon felt-covered oak disks, and each bell is fitted with a resonator which is bolted to the supporting frame of the bell. Upon the same wooden disk with each bell is mounted a direct-current magnet. The wires from the magnets are led through the plane keyboard, only necessary tollet articles and a laun- beneath which are arranged a number


