

JUNKETS MUST BE STOPPED

Judge Troup Says City May Not Pay for Commissioners' Trips.

OVERRULES CITY'S DEMURRER

Holds that Ryder and Kugel May Not Be Paid Out of City Funds for Their Recent Trip to Winnipeg.

Decision that "squandering of the taxpayers' money and abuse of power by city executive," which he said were involved in the paying of expenses of city officials to conventions in other cities—trips commonly known as junkets—must be stopped.

Although Commissioner Ryder already has drawn \$200 of the \$500 allotted, a restraining order may be issued in this case. Judge Troup definitely answered the question whether the taxpayers' money may be spent for "junkets" in the negative.

The petition had been filed by Attorney E. A. Smith.

The demurrer interposed by the city was overruled. According to statements made in court by Corporation Counsel Baker the city will attempt to prevent the issuance of a restraining order in the Ryder-Kugel case, but will not appeal from the decision of the court that "junkets" are illegal.

"The law is all against the city," Judge Troup said. "There is no reason for the incurring of such expenses and never has been. The statement is made that the purpose of such trips is the securing of information of value to the city. If this is the case and the taxpayers are to be burdened for that reason with the expenses of trips by all the city executives to conventions of officials interested in their lines of business, it would be infinitely better if a school of municipal affairs were set up in the city for disseminating the same kind of information. If the city must pay all these expenses certainly a special fund should be set aside for that purpose, but the legislature has given no such power to the city."

A summary of the expenses paid out by the city for junkets taken by the commissioners and aldermen from 1907 to 1912, inclusive, amounts to \$6,707.52.
