Food Commissioner Finds It Largest Producer in the World.

STATE HAS 57 CREAMERIES

Seven Creameries in Omaha Produce Twenty Million Pounds of Butter Annually—Production in Other Cities of Nebraska.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Sept. 11.—(Special.)—According to a report prepared by Food Commissioner Harman there are thirty-seven creameries in Nebraska which have in operation fifty-seven creameries. Of these Douglas county leads the list with seven, while Lancaster stands next with four, Merrick county has three, while the balance have from one to two.

These creameries produce annually in the neighborhood of 50,000,000 pounds of butter per year, which in round figures brings on the market approximately \$15,000,000. These creameries do not make all the butter that is made from Nebraska, as a great deal of cream is shipped to Denver and other Colorado points, to Sioux City, St. Joseph, Council Bluffs and one or two points in Kansas.

The seven creameries in Omaha produce about 20,000,000 pounds of butter annually, which makes it the largest butter producing city in the world. The four creameries at Lincoln produce more than 10,000,000 pounds annually, of which amount the Beatrice Creamery company produces almost 4,000,000 pounds of butter annually, making it the largest creamery in the world. The Fairmount creameries, which are located at Omaha, Crete and Grand Island, taken collectively, manufacture almost 18,000,000 pounds of butter annually.

The largest strictly co-operative creamery in Nebraska is located at Riverton and produces annually in the neighborhood of 20,000,000 pounds of butter.

The fact that only thirty-seven counties have creameries does not mean that the balance of the counties in the state do not produce cream, as practically all but thirty-five local creameries have cream receiving stations at other points. Records show that more than 3,000 people in Nebraska have permits to test and sample cream from this department and every county in the state is represented in this list.

On July 1 of each year all the creameries in Nebraska make application to the food department for a permit to do business and the fee for this permit is based on the number of pounds of butter manufactured and the figures here given are compiled from the reports received by the food department at the time the creameries make applications for permits. There is no way of computing the amount of ice cream made in the state of Nebraska, but the food department has issued between July and the present time 131 permits to retail manufacturers of ice cream and eighty-one permits to wholesale manufacturers of ice cream.

In the larger cities imitation butter is being sold quite extensively, as shown by the permits issued for the sale of such. Since July 1, this year, ninety-two permits have been issued in the city of Omaha alone, while twenty-four in the number of permits issued in the rest of the state.

WARDEN SAVES SOME FISH

Warden Saves Fish. Warden Gust Rutenbeck of the fish commission went to Seward yesterday and in company with some of the farmers between that town and Staplehurst seined the low ponds along the Big Blue river and rescued about 5,000 catfish and sunfish which were in danger of being laid high and dry because of the water going low. They were put in a water tank carried on a hayrack and dumped into the Blue river between the two towns. Some of the catfish, according to Mr. Rutenbeck, were very large, but on account of having been in hot water so long were unfit to eat.

Autolists Take License. That the dry weather has not affected the automobile crop was evidenced this week at the office of Secretary of State Walt who saw even 100 automobile licenses were recorded in that office. However, the crop fell off the next day, only fifty showing up when the mails came in.
