According to the law and the ruling of the commissioner the manufacturer who brands his goods will have to stand good for the amount shown by the brands even after it has gone out of his possession into the hands of a second, third and possibly a fourth party. The new weights and measures law requires that a barrel of flour must contain 196 pounds, half barrel, ninety-eight pounds, a quarter barrel sack forty-eight pounds, eighth barrell sack twenty-four pounds, and a sixteenth barrel sack twelve pounds.

The net amount of flour in weight must be printed on the main label of the sack or barrel and it must be exclusive of the weight of the container. The barrel or sack must have printed

thereon the name of the manufacturer and the place of manufacture. If flour is made of more than one kind
