CORN TAKES A BEARISH TURN Heavy Holders in Futures, Are on the Selling Side of the Market, Bringing About Lower Levels.

OMAHA, Sept. 15, 1912.

There was a stubborn tone to the wheat trade last week, which was greatly encouraged by the large each sales here couraged by the large cash sales here and in Chicago. The northwestern mills took a great quantity of wheat and what they could not use was shipped to the other side of the ocean. One Boston house reported that ocean freight room was engaged for 100 boat loads of hard wheat there Saturday. This is some of the grain which has been going down the lakes so freely during the month. Liverpool was higher last week, due chiefly to light offers of Candian wheat and a show of firmness on this side was seen in consequence. Cables stated that heavier Russian shipments and favorable harvest weather for the United Kingdom checked the advance. Frost appeared in a number of spots over the northwest this morning, but there was no claim that any damage was done on either side of the international line.
