Killing Cattle Active and Stronger, with Feeders Some Easier.

CHICAGO. Sept. 18.—Wheat owners here, who have been troubled by the outlook for heavy shipments duty free to this country from Canada, unloaded today with increasing vigor, moved by news that Canadian threshing was being completed much earlier than in former years. The market closed weak, be to be lower. Corn lost be to be net and oats be to be. In provisions the outcome ranged from 50 decline to 13 se advance.

Advices from the Canadian northwest indicated that threshing of wheat was likely to be finished by October 1. In other seasons a great deal of the crop there could not be threshed before winter set in. Further discouragement for the buils here lay in statements that the Canadian farmers were marketing freely, being well pleased with prices and grading, whereas dispatches from Minneapolis told of many cars carried over from the previous day unsold.

Only at the outset was there any show of strength in wheat. Higher cables and light receipts northwest formed the reason, but the trade soon decided that there was more than an offset in the fact that the Italian crop, instead of being short, would surpass the highest record of recent years.

Corn developed weakness after a strong start. Liverpool reported Argentina corn was being purchased there for the United States, but the bullish effect of this news wore away because of uncisiness regard-ing continued liberal arrivals in Chicago. There was much profit-taking on the part of leading holders. The market was fur-ther weakened by a surprisingly bearsh crop estimate from a well-known expert.

Oats followed corn. Eastern call was slim, and there was fairly good selling on speculative account.

Provisions in the main were higher with

at an early hour. The prices paid as compared with yesterday were strong and in many cases as much as 15g35c higher than last week. Good corn feds that sold at 18.85g8.30 at the beginning of the week, sold up as high as 19.15 for heavyweights. Cows and befers sold quite freely and the market was strong, everything being disposed of in, good season.

Stockers and feeders, as is almost invariably the case the latter part of the week, were not in such active demand as speculators already had a good many held over from yesterday. For this reason the trade was less active than earlier in the week and prices were a little lower in consequence.
