DENVER CLUB MAY BE SOLD

Rumor Has it that McGill Buys the Indianapolis Club.

HENDRICKS ALSO IS TO GO

McGill Reserves Manager Hendricks and Four Denver Players to His Own Use—Smith Gets Denver Club.

According to Jack Wilson in the Denver Post, it is almost a certainty that the Denver Base Ball club will not be headed or owned next year by Jimmie McGill, and that Jack Hendricks, manager of the Bears, will not be with the club. It is also stated by Wilson that Jimmie McGill has just about closed negotiations to purchase the Indianapolis club of the American association in consideration of \$100,000.

It seems that McGill offered Bob Myers of the Indianapolis club \$125,000, and then raised the ante to \$100,000. Myers held out for \$125,000 and \$12,000 additional for Mike Kelly, manager. McGill refused to pay this and called the deal off, but Myers reconsidered his action and agreed to sell for \$100,000, providing the other \$12,000 could be disposed of to Indianapolis business men. McGill, seeing the value of having some local money invested, agreed to this compromise, and the much-talked-of "Indianapolis deal" has virtually been closed.

With McGill's purchase of the Indianapolis club the automatic sale of the Denver club to Eddie Smith, the well known Chicago sport writer, will follow. The purchase price of the Denver club has never been made public, but Smith will get little more than the franchise and a lease with but a few years lease) to run on the Broadway park.
