Schoolboy Amateur Takes Highest Golfing Honors in Nation by Winning in Playoff.

Victory of Youth Carries with it Gold Medal and Custody of Championship Cup by Home Organization.

BROOKLINE, Mass., Sept. 20.-Francis Ouimet, a school boy amateur of Brookline, won the highest golfing honors in the country, if not in the world, by defeating Harry Vardon and Edward Ray, the English professionals by five and six strokes, respectively, in the play-off for

the American open championship today. The victory of the boy carried with it gold medal and the custody of the championship cup by his home organization, the Woodlawn Golf club of Newton. No amateur in this country, and only one abroad has ever gained such golfing fame. There were few of the people following the play, who felt at the start that the youth could not possibly van-

quish such renowned veterans as the two former British champions. In order to win Oulmet was obliged to play the best golf of the week. When he had accomplished the first 16 holes in 65 strokes and made the seventeenth ft. a wonderful three, Vardon, his closest opponent broke under the strain.

Oulmet did not get into the lead until the turn for the home holes. All three made the half-way mark in even 32. But after that he was never headed.
