Bowling events Monday night will be the opening of the Commercial league at Metropolitan alleys at 8 o'clock and the opening of the Fairmont Creamery league at Morrison alleys at 8 o'clock.

Last week found two more leagues starting out on their season of 1913-14. The Booster and Omaha Gas leagues got under way, both with stronger organizations than they had last year.

The Booster league especially made a good showing with some large mid-season scores. The Gas league didn't break any records, but the enthusiasm displayed on the first night shows that they will be one of Omaha's strongest organizations.

In addition to the above the Magic City, Fairmont Creamery, Lithographers and Gate City leagues have started, making six leagues on the bowling field. This week will find the Commercial and Metropolitan leagues on the alleys, the Commercial league having the grand opening tomorrow night.

With the Omaha, Automobile and Standard Oil leagues still to be heard from this makes a total of ten organized leagues rolling in the twin cities to say nothing of the probability of leagues being organized on the Vinton Street alleys and at Fort Omaha and Crook.

The Omaha and Standard Oil leagues have completed their organizations and have announced their opening for the second week in October. President Trainor of the Auto league has called no meeting yet, but will do so at an early date.

The Gas league opened up Friday night with a six-team organization. This year the teams will have five men instead of three as before. The Morrison alleys will be their home.

Don Amnden did not show up last week. It seems as though the models occupied most of Don's spare time. This accounts for his non-appearance at his old familiar haunts.

Harry Eldson says that the new Clara Belle shirts would not be out of place at a fancy dress ball. They are better than a stiff front as the Clara Belle will need it this year.

Schoeman's picture will not be published until he gets to going better. He hasn't been heard from since last year's Midwest tournament, when he won the individual championship, but he says he will again be on hand with a big noise.

Omaha bowlers seem to be well pleased with the way this season is going. Every alley in the city has been given thorough attention in the best possible condition. The hook ball bowlers are extremely jubilant on account of the way their league has prospered. The Metropolitan and Gate City alleys were formerly work up alleys, but this season they work almost as well for the hook ball or backup artist.

There seems to be a great deal of doubt in the minds of many about the organization of the Omaha league. The Omaha league has already been organized and will hold its final meeting at the Association alleys Sunday morning, September 23, at 10 o'clock. At present the style of play and place of playing is up to the air. Many are in favor of a traveling league, while many are against it, but this point will be definitely settled at their next meeting.

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Former Creighton Student Captures Honors in Germany

Julius Fester, a member of the class of 1912 at the Creighton Arts college, and an Omaha boy, is still upsetting the athletic records of the fatherland and incidentally the athletic aspirations of a number of his sons. Frequent reports from Germany, where Fester is American vice consul at the port of Barmen, have told of his successes, and recent news direct from Germany states that he is still winning.

Recently Mr. Fester has taken part in four meets, winning distinction in all. The meets were held at Watter, a pretty little town on the Ruhr river, at Velbert, at Husten, and finally at Solingen, the famous cutlery center. At Watter Mr. Fester competed with 1,000 other athletes in the 100 meter dash, shot put, high jump, pole vault for distance, and classical exercises, and captured eight titles. At Velbert he landed first place in a field of eighty-nine athletes. At Husten he won first place in a three-event competition, consisting of a 100 meter dash, shot put, and the hop-step-
