LINCOLN, Sept. 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Dr. Titus Lowe of Cedar Falls, Ia., was appointed pastor of the First Methodist church, Omaha, last night by Bishop Frank M. Bristol, who read the ministerial assignments at midnight, just before the conference adjournment.

Dr. Lowe will take the place vacated by Rev. M. B. Williams, who was district superintendent of the Lincoln district with headquarters at Lincoln. This assignment came as a surprise to all who were watching the settlement of the controversy over the first church pastorate and it was said tonight there was some question whether Rev. Mr. Williams would accept the place which was made without consultation with him. He is quoted as saying he would not accept.

Dr. N. A. Martin, district superintendent at Lincoln last year, took location on account of the health of Mrs. Martin, the bishop in open conference denying that this step was forced upon him.

No other change was made in the Omaha parishes.

INFANT MORTALITY IS LOW

Death Rate in Omaha Among Children Shows Decided Decrease.

CAMPAGNS BRING GOOD RESULTS

Frequent Warnings Published by Newspapers Given by Dr. Connell as Reason for This City's Fine Showing.

Health Commissioner R. W. Connell, in a report on infant mortality in Omaha during the summer months, says campaigns for more sanitary conditions, pure milk and frequent warnings in newspapers have resulted in a decided decrease in the death rate of babies.

During June, July and August, 1912, sixty-three babies under 1 year died in Omaha, but for the same months this year the deaths were only forty-two, or a decrease of 33 per cent.

"Mothers are taking better care of their children," said the health commissioner, "and the city health department is keeping conditions so clean, so carefully inspected and sanitary that the dangers to babies are gradually decreasing."

Dr. Connell says a campaign will be started early in the coming year by physicians and newspapers and co-operating organizations to still further reduce the infant mortality rate.

OVER THE ENTIRE WEST

Dr. Joseph Kosuth Dixon of the Rodman-Wanamaker party that left Philadelphia on a western tour to study the customs, habits and characteristics of the American Indians, has changed the route of his itinerary, so that he will visit the Winnebago and Omaha in Thurston county, this state.

The members of the party travel in the private car Signet, which will be delivered to the Burlington at Denver, November 2. From there the car will go to Lincoln, thence going to Winnebago city, reaching there November 4 at 1:30 o'clock in the evening. That night and the whole of the following day until 9:30 in the afternoon will be spent with the Indians of Thurston county. One of the purposes of the party is to see that the Indians have special reverence for the American flag and the principles for which it stands.
