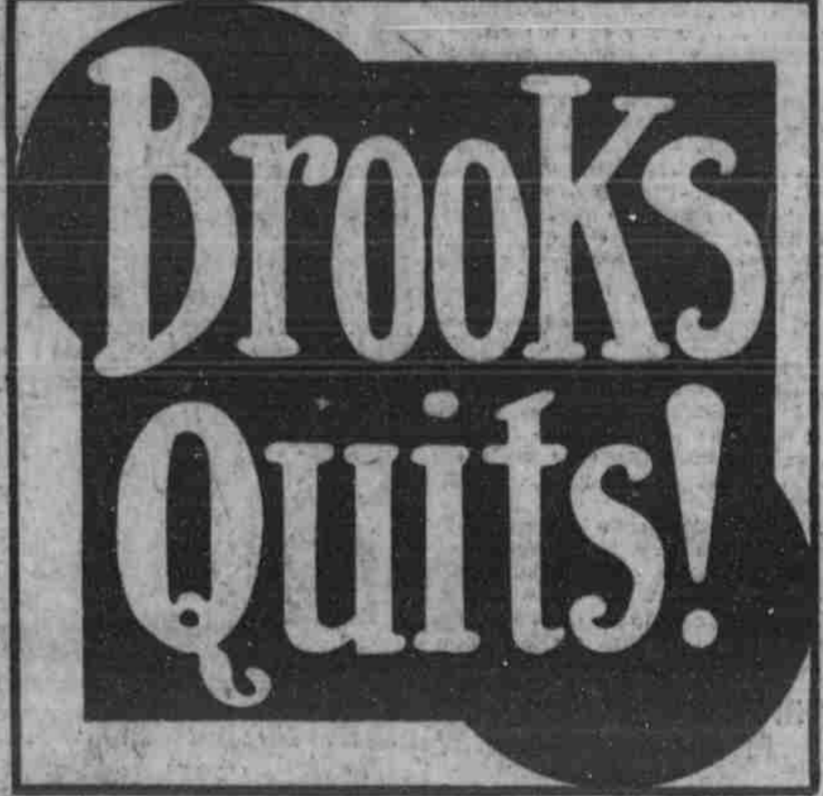

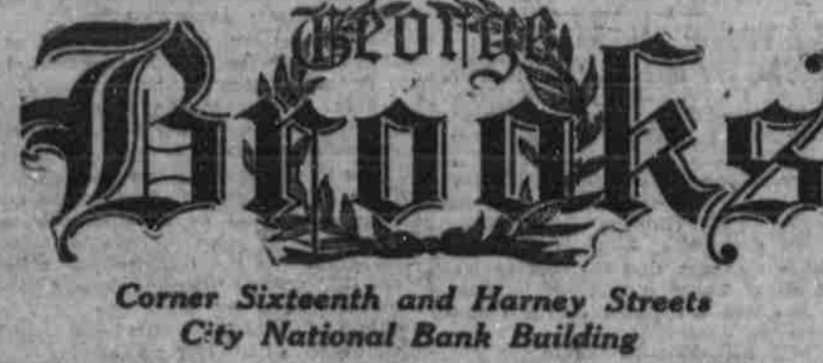

ENJOINS PUBLISHING REPORT

Patron and Matron of Yester Chapter of Eastern Star Plaintiffs. SAY REPORT WAS NOT ADOPTED

Grand Secretary Anna C. Simpson of the Nebraska chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star has been enjoined in district court from causing to be published as part of the grand patron's report a statement alleged to reflect upon worthy patrons of this chapter. A temporary restraining order was signed and hearing set for October 13 at 9:30 o'clock. The worthy patron and worthy matron, plaintiffs in the suit, inform the court that the copy for the report has already been delivered to the printer and that if the printing of it is not prevented irreparable injury will be done to them by the sending of the alleged untrue statement to Eastern Star chapters throughout the world. A temporary restraining order was signed and hearing set for October 13 at 9:30 o'clock. The objectionable statement follows: "Early in March, received from several members of Yester chapter No. 1 written complaints of official misconduct against the worthy matron and worthy patron of this chapter. Claiming that they had allowed a brother to assume the matron's office to receive admission to a number of the chap or and that a brother had been allowed to address the chapter speaking disrespectfully of the grand chapter and grand chapter officers; that they were allowing the good name of the Order of the Eastern Star to be impaired. After careful investigation I requested the worthy matron and worthy patron to meet me at the Masonic temple April 2 and in the presence of the grand matron

called their attention to these complaints, requesting them to observe the law and see that the dignity of the grand chapter was maintained at all times." The plaintiffs allege that this statement was never regularly adopted by the grand chapter of the state of which Yester chapter No. 1 is a branch, but was referred to a special committee for consideration, hence that it is not really a part of the proceedings of the grand chapter and should not be published in the report. Western Ranchers Will Winter More Cattle Than Ever

Advice to the railroads indicates that the range through western Nebraska and Wyoming is in the best condition in years, and that the ranchers are preparing to winter more cattle than ever before. Their grassed steers are in good condition and are moving to market at a lively rate. In the past, say the railroad men, the ranchers of this state and Wyoming have been heretofore selling their cows in the fall, but this year they are doing nothing of the kind. Instead, they are keeping them for breeding purposes and are buying more, paying fancy prices for them. This week at Lusk, Wyo., a bunch of cows were put on the market by one of the big ranchers who has cut his land into smaller holdings and the cows brought on an average of 17, the highest price ever known out there. All through the west this year the ranch owners, in addition to having put up plenty of hay, have an abundance of alfalfa and coarse feed. Many of them, instead of throwing their range steers on the market, are going to hold them over and finish them off for fancy beef later in the season. Many, too, especially in the country north of the Black Hills, are shipping in corn and fattening their steers themselves, instead of selling them

to feeders to be shipped and fed in northern Nebraska, Iowa and Minnesota. where a fairly good corn crop has been grown. These ranchers figure that they might as well have the feeding profit that heretofore has gone to the professional feeders.
