DATE OF ELECTION IS FIXED

Home Rule Charter, Auditorium and Library Bonds on Same Day.

COMMISSIONERS ARE UNANIMOUS

Many Citizens Appear in the Council Chamber to Urge that Date for Various Bond Votes May Be Set.

Voting unanimously city commissioners in committee of the whole yesterday recommended the special election ordinance calling for a vote on the home rule charter, a \$25,000 bond issue for the purchase of the auditorium and a \$25,000 library bond issue for passage. The date of the election was fixed for November 4. It is probable that separate ballots for the three propositions will be prepared by the election commissioner at the request of the supporters of each proposition.

A large number of business men appeared to advocate the purchase of the auditorium, saying it would be impossible to entertain large conventions here without the building. T. J. Mahoney, Boone Miller, E. V. Parrish, C. C. Heiden, John E. Reagan and J. M. Gillan said the structure should be purchased. Gillan believed, under proper management, the auditorium would be self-sustaining.

City commissioners said the election fund was practically depleted, so that it may be necessary to pass an emergency ordinance in order to defray the expense of this special election.

Frank L. Haller and A. C. Kennedy advocated the passage of the library bond ordinance. Mr. Haller said the city needed a larger museum and this would give an opportunity to provide space for it. Mr. Kennedy said the library had been of great service to the schools, branch libraries having been established, and he believed with the building enlarged the facilities for better work would be obtained.

The was no discussion of the home rule charter, the commissioners recommending the ordinance for passage with no dissenting vote.

Oldest Settler of Nebraska Visits Old Friends in Omaha

One of the oldest settlers of Nebraska, Samuel David Bouvier, father, 70 years old, Washington county, made a periodical visit to his friend, Justice of the Peace C. W. Britt, Monday, Mr. Bouvier came to Nebraska at the big land boom in Washington county in 1854 and since then he has lived on the same farm.

When Mr. Bouvier came to Nebraska there were but three log cabins in Omaha. Those three huts were down at the foot of Douglas street. De Sota, in Washington county, was the town to which Mr. Bouvier had started. The Astors had a fur trading post at De Sota. The town was pre-arranged as the coming city of the west, and some held that the state capitol should be there. Business was brisk there in the early days. Mr. Bouvier said the Indians gave him no trouble. The corn raised on his 125 acres has won for him first prize at a number of fairs.

Mr. Bouvier's father, Louis Bouvier, was a personal friend of Daniel Boone in the early days down in Kentucky, the state from which Mr. Bouvier started for Nebraska.

A number of Omahans have hunted on Mr. Bouvier's farm. Among them are Judge Britt, Judge Wakelzer, Judge Doane, J. J. Brown, Griffith Cooley, "Judge" Cooley, Randall Brown, Jim Boyd and Peter Sarp.

Dairy Special Has Given Farmers New Ideas on Farming

"The running of the dairy special through Nebraska will result in adding thousands of dollars to the annual output of the farmers residing along the route over which the train passed," said D. Clem Deaver of the Burlington's home-seeking department, who has just returned from having accompanied the lecturers, who were out ten days.

"Everywhere the train stopped," added Mr. Deaver, "there were crowds of farmers gathered to listen to the lecturers and learn the lessons relative to practical and scientific dairying. The questions asked following the lectures showed that the farmers, many of whom came from ten to twenty miles, were greatly interested."

"The result of the trip means that from now on the Nebraska farmers who listened to the talks will give more attention to raising cows for the milk and will farm along different lines than in the past. More attention will be paid to raising forage plants and stock foods and not so much to raising grain simply for market. It has started the men out on a new line of thought and eventually this trip is going to bring northern and western Nebraska into the foreground as a dairying section."

Beryl Crocker Dies Suddenly at Cedar Rapids of Typhoid

Beryl Crocker, son of E. H. Crocker, formerly of the Union Pacific legal department, died Saturday very suddenly from an attack of typhoid fever. Beryl Crocker was 30 years old and a graduate of the Omaha High school of the class of 1912 and was a student at the University of Omaha and later the University of Nebraska.

Crocker was a star athlete while attending the high school here, in basketball, football and track. During his senior year he was captain of the basketball team that won the state championship and was on the football team that defeated Wendell Phillips. He was prominent socially and a member of the Les Hiboux fraternity. He held various class offices during his senior year here at the high school and was connected with the staff of the High School Register, the school paper, and was a member of the Hoosters' club and occupied a seat in the senior council. He was, in addition, captain of Company D of the high school cadet regiment in his last year.

Beryl Crocker was as popular at the University of Omaha and the University of Nebraska as he was at the high school. He played on the basketball team at Omaha and distinguished himself by his clever work at forward. At Nebraska he was a member of the engineering college.

E. H. Crocker, Beryl's father, resigned from the legal department of the Union Pacific August 1 to accept the position of general attorney for the street car company and power plant at Cedar Rapids, Ia. Beryl went to Cedar Rapids with the family and obtained a position in the engineering department of the company, intending to work a year before returning to school. He was busy at Cedar Rapids when the fever became contracted and he died a short while afterward.

Flowers will be sent from the legal department of the Union Pacific in Omaha and it is probable that one or two members will go to Cedar Rapids today to attend the funeral. E. J. Peterson, general claim agent of the road, says he will go if it is possible to get away from his work.

Union Pacific to Try to Eliminate Drinking Trainmen

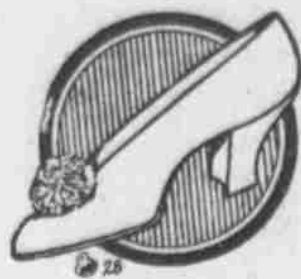
The Union Pacific proposes to now enforce the general order against trainmen drinking while on duty. Such an order has been in existence for years, but it has not been enforced to the letter. Now, however, notice has been sent to the brotherhoods of all trainmen that members of the orders who are employees of the road will be dismissed when it is learned that they are addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors.

It is said at headquarters that the enforcement of the liquor drinking order is not for the purpose of curtailing any of the liberties of the men, but is simply for the purpose of assuring more safety to themselves and the people who are on the trains and in their charge.

For years the Union Pacific has kept tabs on its trainmen and has ascertained that but a small per cent of them are addicted to drink and the idea now is to entirely eliminate all drinking by engineers, firemen, conductors and all others who have to do with the running of trains.
