ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 9.-A general denial of all the charges against Governor Sulzer, a bitter attack on the testimony of Duncan W. Before beginning work this morning Governor Morehead talked to the big gang of convicts who were to work on the road. He told them that they were guns would be taken along to intimidate them. They were dressed in citizens clothes, and as one looked at the gang at work there was no indication that any o fthem were wards of the state.

Works with Convicts. There were several life-termers and two wenty-year men, but that made no difference. Bide by side with the executive they made good their promise that they would not attempt to get away.

His experience today working side by side with convicts from the penitentlary and the manner in which they kept their promise not to attempt to get away led the governor tonight to say that he believed the men who could be trusted should be put to work on the roads. They had much rather be out in this way than to be inside and most of them can be trusted," said the governor. "I believe we ought to use them keeping our roads in good shape.
