PRICE OF SUGAR WILL DROP

Al King Sees Likelihood of it Going Down Considerably.

RAIN BRINGS NEW TOMATOES

They Are Selling Somewhat Cheaper—Grape Fruit and Apples Are Beginning to Arrive on Local Market.

Sugar may drop off 11 or 12 cents a sack within the next six months, is the prediction of Al King of the grocery department of Hayden Bros. It is off a little this week and is retailing at twenty-one pounds for \$1. Mr. King believes that the sugar schedule in the new tariff law will have its effect in the price of sugar, although the schedule goes into effect gradually. Sugar is now worth \$1.35 a sack retail. "I look for it to come down to \$1 or \$1.25 within the next six months," says Mr. King.

The recent rains have brought on a second crop of tomatoes of a quality larger and smoother than was the crop of the summer and early fall. The coming of the second crop has brought the price down somewhat. They are now selling at 40 cents per market basket, whereas during the dry weather of September they had reached 90 and 70 cents a basket. Green tomatoes are also on the market yet, and are now quoted at some places as low as 15 cents a market basket.

Big Apples Here.

Jonathan and Grimes Golden apples from Washington are here. They are of an excellent quality this year and are quoted retail at \$2.35 per bushel box. Kieffer pears are still plentiful and have come down a dime a bushel, now retailing at \$1.40 a bushel. Concord grapes are off the market, but Tokays are still plentiful.

Cranberries and new figs have appeared. Good quality of cranberries are retailing at 7 1/2 cents a quart. New figs in twelve-ounce packages are going at 7 1/2 cents.

White plum celery from Council Bluffs has begun to come in in big lots. It is retailing three bunches for a dime or 25 cents a dozen.

The peach season is practically over. Few grocers are carrying peaches in crates now. The large shipments are past, and although a few "tramp" cars may appear yet, it is not expected that there will be any appreciable quantity will again make their appearance on the Omaha market this fall.

Atlantic Boys Who Register Under False Names Are Released

ATLANTIC, Ia., Oct. 9.—(Special.)—As a result of giving their wrong names and addresses when they registered at the Cardiff hotel Sunday night Roy Swanger and E. L. Bruce of Greenfield were arrested by the Council Bluffs police Monday as they stepped from a train which they had taken from this city, on the charge of being the men who had committed the theft of the \$1,500 in notes and money from under the pillow of the bed in room 21 at the Cardiff hotel Monday morning. F. M. Joslin, the man whose money was stolen, had left on an afternoon train Monday before the men were apprehended, and returned to this city that evening in response to a telegram sent him by Marshal Moore of this city. He returned and went with Moore yesterday morning to Council Bluffs to bring the men back to this city. Upon their arrival there the police authorities told them that they had the men through the sweatbox separately, but that they both told straight stories, from which neither varied under the most severe grilling. They were brought to this city and again raked over the coals in Mayor Burnam's court, but insisted that they were not guilty and stuck to it. After their examination County Attorney T. C. Whitmore made a motion that they be released for lack of evidence, as there was not a particle of evidence against them with the exception of the facts that Bruce had registered on the hotel book that he was from Union Center, Ia., while Swanger had given his name and address as Mr. Smith of Creston. The men, who are farmers' sons of Greenfield, said that they had registered in that manner simply for the novelty of it. They were released after being cleared from the smallest shadow of suspicion. They are both from good families and are honest looking boys.

Sororities have already forbidden their members to dance anything but the ordinary waltzes and two-steps, and the social committee at the university has forbidden the tango.
