Will Hold Sessions in Omaha Two Days This Week.

INTERESTING SPEAKERS HERE

One of the Meetings Will Be Held in the Court House, So the Public May Listen to the Speakers. The Nebraska Library association will hold its nineteenth annual meeting at the Omaha public library October 15, 16 and 17. Miss Georgene Faulkner of the Chicago Kindergarten school of that name, will be one of the principal speakers at the evening meeting of October 16, which will be the only one held away from the library. Miss Faulkner will speak on the subject, "Story Telling for Children," and will tell of the reading which should be done by children. This is a subject which is most interesting to intellectual people. The lecture room of the public library is not large enough to seat the number who wish to avail themselves of the opportunity of hearing Miss Faulkner, and for this reason the original court

room on the fourth floor of the new court house will be used for the meeting of the 16th. The first meeting of the association will be held Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the lecture room of the public library. Reports will be read from the different libraries and officers for the coming year will be elected. Miss Mary Hutchinson of Falls City will read a paper on "Personal Relations with the Public." Mr. A. E. Sheldon, librarian of the legislature at Lincoln, will speak on the legislative reference bureau. Following the afternoon meeting a dinner will be served for the visiting librarians by the Commercial club at the club rooms at 4:30 o'clock. Talk on Reference Work. Hummel Building Artificial Lake

Joe B. Hummel, city commissioner of parks, is completing the construction of an artificial lake at the west side of Carter lake. A suction dredge and a clamshell dredge have been working for ten days to dig the lake, remove the dirt and erect an embankment around it. The lake will be two blocks long and one block wide, with an island in the center. It will be used as a sort of harbor. Seventy yards of earth is being removed from the artificial lake each hour by the suction dredge. WIND STORM BLOWS DOWN ICE HOUSE IN CONSTRUCTION. A severe storm of tornado character blew down three new walls of the E. J. Cornish ice house at Carter's lake Thursday night. The damage done to the building, which is in the course of construction, will amount, according to the building contractors, between \$800 and \$1,000. The entire side of the west wall, 400 feet in length, was blown down, together with two other sides, each 100 feet in length.
