Weather Reports Have Active Influence Over Corn Shorts.

WHEAT MARKET IS OVERSOLD

Grain World is Obligated to Take Cognizance of Fact that Premiums for Cash Article Are Much Stronger.

OMAHA, Oct. 11. (1318.) There was quite a stir in the reports received from sections of the belt where heavy rains and mild temperatures have been seen for several days past. As the promise was for continued unsettled weather in sections of the country where corn is raised, not only shorts became good buyers, but there was a demand for corn in the well. Dry weather and cold is now necessary. With the terrible losses in Kansas and Oklahoma, it is slow going to make up the corn belt, and with sensational bull markets for some time past, the average speculator is slow to make liberal commitments on the bear or short side, and stand on his shoulders with the expectation of taking down a profit.

Those who have played the short side of corn for months past have been obliged to do their best to get back accounts every few days. The speculators on the bull or long side of the market have enjoyed excellent results. Cash corn was 10c lower. The wheat world was obliged to take cognizance of the fact that the premiums for the cash article were growing much stronger and many of those who were short were obliged to cover. It is now accepted the fact that the market is largely oversold by the advances of the spring wheat market. On the face of a very liberal government report the strength displayed was remarkable. The spring wheat market was active and advanced, but the country was there was a general absence of hedging transactions, with prices showing a marked reaction.

Cash wheat was 10c lower. Holders of oats failed to take to the market yesterday. The upturn in corn was not followed by any other grain. Some of the more conservative speculators in the trade were advising caution in selling prices. Cash oats were 4c lower. NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

New Low Point Reached in Protracted Decline.

RAID MOST SUCCESSFUL YET

Bank Statement Makes a Better Showing Than Had Been Looked For—Actual Cash Loss Only About Million.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—A new low point was reached today in the protracted decline of the stock market. There was an increased supply of stocks from traders on both sides of the market, with the chief impetus coming from the bears. The rail with which they began the day's trading was the most successful, and they drove the market down 1 1/2 points in the first few minutes. Later, however, the market rallied, but the bid did not hold its advantage and the close was near the lowest.

The conspicuous point was the entire absence of any consistent demand which was held on by the bears as ammunition, as were intimations from Washington that the government was contemplating new anti-trust measures. It was less the positive influence of these developments, however, than the absence of any consistent demand which weakened the market and made it easy to hammer down stocks. The uncertain outlook for business and money, the effect of the new tariff law and the course of events at Washington have made the present situation such a doubtful one, in the opinion of traders and investors, that speculators are unwilling to buy stocks.

The bank statement made a better showing than had been looked for, the actual cash loss was only about \$1,000,000 and in consequence of a sealing down of deposits. Weakness continued in bonds, with Steel's falling to par. Total sales par, \$100,000,000. United States 2's and 3's advanced 1/4 on call on the week. BLOW AT THE CIVIL SERVICE

Democrats Vote to Make Pie Counter More Accessible.

FITZGERALD LEADS THE REVOLT

Removal of Deputy Internal Revenue Collectors and Marshals from Regulations Provided in Amendment.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—By the closest vote of the session, 111 to 104, the house tonight voted to recede from its conference disagreement and to concur in the senate amendment to the urgent deficiency appropriation bill, which provides for the removal of deputy internal revenue collectors and deputy marshals from civil service regulations. The vote came after a protracted debate, in which many democrats bitterly assailed the proposal as a direct blow at civil service reform. It was a step backward toward the spoils system. The democratic revolt was led by Representative Fitzgerald of New York and fifty-four democrats voted against the concurrence, which was brought up on a motion by Representative Bartlett of Georgia, Representative Underwood, the majority leader, who did not take part in the debate, was loudly cheered when he voted aye. Four members voted present, six more than a quorum answering to their names.

Other matters in disagreement, among them an appropriation of \$7,000 for an automobile for the vice president, will be taken up when the house meets tomorrow. Representative Fitzgerald of New York injected into the debate a speech on New York politics and a defense of Tammany Hall, attacking John Purroy Mitchel, fusion candidate for mayor of New York. He said he was sick and tired of hearing Tammany vilified by opponents of the democratic party and declared that democrats should not be a party to it.
