NEW TRUST CONCERN FORMED

To Be Known as the United States Trust Company.

CAPITALIZATION IS \$500,000

A new trust company, to be known as the United States Trust company, with a capitalization of \$500,000, completed organization yesterday afternoon and will commence business immediately at the Byron Reed company offices, 212 South Seventeenth street.

The officers of the new company as elected yesterday are: Abraham L. Reed, president; Gordon W. Wattle, vice president; Harry G. Jordan, secretary and treasurer; Victor Caldwell, trust officer, and J. T. Miquist, assistant trust officer.

In New Building. After the new United States National bank building at the northwest corner of Sixteenth and Farnam streets is erected it will be started in March the trust company will have handsome headquarters there.

PLANS ARE MATURED FOR INTERURBAN LINE

President Musser of Omaha, Lincoln & Beatrice Road Says Work Will Be Pushed.

TELLS OF EQUIPMENT NEEDED

Death of Stockholder Robinson Left Project in Air, but Activity Begins to Protect Franchise Interests.

When the engineers have examined the plans, charts and estimates of cost necessary to build the Omaha, Lincoln & Beatrice interurban railway from Beatrice to Omaha, which were yesterday filed with the State Railway commission with an application of President Harvey Musser and Secretary H. S. Norton for permission to issue \$2,000,000 in bonds and \$50,000 in stock for the building of the road, the commission will give notice of a hearing in the matter.

In speaking of the matter, President Musser said: "We have lost considerable money pushing the line as far as we have and we expect to lose considerable more, but we do not intend to stop until the road is completed. At the time the road was started both Mr. Robinson and myself had faith in Nebraska as a future interurban state, and we are confident that a line from Omaha, the metropolis of the state, to Lincoln, the capital city, would in time be a paying investment, but when Mr. Robinson died nothing could be done for some time, as his estate held the stock and still holds it."

Recently the Lincoln Traction company, which now runs as far east as Havelock, announced that it would continue the line to Omaha some time in the future and it is supposed that the agitation of the sharp interests has weakened the Ohio people to the fact that they will have to protect their line by getting busy. Franchisees have already been granted the Robinson road through the town of University Place, Bethany, Waverly, Greenwood, Ashland, Springfield, Papillion and South Omaha and the boards of county commissioners of Douglas and Sarpy counties have given authority for construction through the two counties.

The Northern Construction company has already agreed to take over the bonds as soon as they are available and will begin construction of the road immediately upon delivery of the bonds.

Fort Dodge Men Declare They Have Been Swindled. FORT DODGE, Ia., Jan. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—Thirty Fort Dodge men are promoting an investigation of what they believe is a swindle in which they invested \$150,000 in amounts from \$10 to \$75 each. Smooth talkers purporting to be from the mines took them to inspect lots south of the city for sale at \$7.50. They urged the men, mostly laborers, to make part payments on purchases. One man recently sent payment by mail which was returned unclaimed, and it is now thought the promoters attempted to sell land they had merely leased from the government.

Officers of Cincinnati Trust Company Indicted. CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 4.—N. S. Keith, former secretary, and F. H. Williams, former treasurer of the Cincinnati Trust company, of which George B. Cox, was the head, were indicted today, charged with misapplication of the company's funds. Evidence showed that the total loans made by the company to the Ford-Johnston Furniture company reached more than \$1,000,000.

PIE HUNTERS AWAIT GOVERNOR'S ARRIVAL TO DISPENSE PLACES

New Executive Announces He Will Be in Capital City Monday to Take the Helm.

WAITING ONES VERY HUNGRY

Jobs Are Not Numerous and Applicants Are Many.

MEMBERS STILL SLOW TO COME

Not Enough Gather to Get Line on the Speakership.

NO ELECTION TO FILL VACANCY

Governor Aldrich Disposed to Leave All Questions Now Arising to Be Settled by His Successor in Office.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 4.—(Special.)—"He won't be here till Monday" is the doleful wail of office seekers who were waiting patiently for the appearance of one J. H. Morehead, who they have been informed will operate a pie counter as soon as he arrives.

The announcement was authoritatively made late last night that the governor's announcement that he would be in Lincoln "after the first" did not mean the day following. The pie hunters made the mistake of thinking that the governor would be just as anxious to see them as they were to see him, and his delay will only make the waiting ones the more hungry when the most looked for man in Nebraska arrives.

Members Coming In. Members of the legislature came in in greater numbers today and the hotels are beginning to take on a "just before the battle" appearance. Very little can be done outside, however, as the offices, candidates for the speakership of the house are all here and are meeting the members as fast as they show up at the hotels. Representative McKelvie of Gage county was the first on the job and was quickly joined by Representative Potts of Pawnee county. Yesterday Representative Fuller of Sedgewick arrived and all three are working for the speakership plum. Dr. Kelly of Grand Island is also a candidate.

Henry Richmond of Omaha seems to have the thing all his way for the office of chief clerk of the house, although it has been announced W. W. Lancaster is also a candidate.

President of Senate. In the senate the fight for the presidency of the senate will be a three-cornered one; the candidates being Senator Charles L. Saunders of Douglas, Senator J. H. Kemp of Nance and Senator Walter V. Hoesland of North Platte. The fight for secretary of the senate will be a lively affair, four candidates already being after the position. These are Clyde Barnard of Pawnee, J. Reid Green of Lancaster, T. W. Bass and Broken Bow, and this morning a new man stepped into the arena, W. E. Post of Columbus. The latter is a son of Judge A. M. Post and has been acting as secretary of the re-codifying committee.

Two weeks from the date of organization the two houses will ballot for United States senator, and the usual spectacle is expected to be witnessed of a legislature, democratic on joint ballot, by a majority of five, electing a republican senator. Congressman George W. Norris of the Fifth district, the republican primary nominee, received a majority of the popular vote in the November election, and under the "Oregon" system will probably receive practically the solid vote of the legislature. No democratic member has thus far indicated any other plan than to vote for Norris.

The inauguration of John H. Morehead to succeed Governor Aldrich will take place Thursday.

Caucuses for the house and senate positions will probably not be held before Monday.

No Special Election. Governor Aldrich will not call a special election to fill the vacancy in the Sixty-ninth representative district, caused by the death of Representative W. Z. Taylor, at least until he has received official notice that such a vacancy exists.

The law provides that in case a vacancy occurs before the legislature convenes, within five days thereafter the governor shall call a special election to fill such vacancy, giving ten days' notice.
