The attitude of the Balkan alijes during today's session of the conference was foreshadowed by Dr. S. Daneff, the chief of the Bulgarian delegation, who said: We expect that the Turks will be unable to give us acceptable conditions. The negotiations will then be broken off. We

Austria Reservists Returning. DENVER, Colo., Jan. 4.-Chevaller Michel de Straszewski, Austro-Hungarian consul, said today that he is sending Austrian army reservists home from Colorado on orders received from the government at Vienna. The men sent home include both reservists who have served in the Austrian army and those who left Austria without having had military service. Both classes are liable to military duty according to Austrian laws, but they cannot be compelled to return from a foreign country. Many are returning voluntarily at the order from the consul.




