WOMEN ATTACK OFFICERS

Insist on Right to Cross Burlington Railroad Tracks.

PUT THE OFFICERS TO FLIGHT

Police Then Turn In a Riot Call and Women Flee Before the Valiant Charge of the Emergency Squad.

One hundred and fifty to 200 irate women and a handful of men attacked two Burlington detectives at 4:30 yesterday morning when the officers refused to let one woman cross the tracks at Second and Poplar streets. The women used for weapons such things as cans, nails, rocks, clubs, canes, old shoes and crockstools.

Special Officer Wilson says for the last three months he has been warning the women about crossing the tracks. Mary Hladek attempted to cross the Burlington tracks and Wilson told her to go around. She refused to do so and when he used further persuasion Mary gave out several lusty calls for help and laid down in the center of the tracks and screamed. The entire female population of the colony across from the distillery answered Mary's call for help.

Charge on Officers. Streaming out onto the tracks with all sorts of weapons and brandishing them above their heads they charged on the two officers. The latter fores were far outnumbered and they made a hasty retreat for the switch house. The women, however, stormed the barracks and Officer Ellis, Wilson's partner, sent a riot call to police headquarters and a patrolman traveled to the scene of battle in the emergency automobile.

The women, however, saw the reinforcements coming and in wild disorder made for their homes. Four women and one man were arrested. They were Mary Hladek, Paul Hladek, Antonia Svoboda, Annie Polivka and Annie Peters.
