

MCDONALD MAY BE CHAIRMAN

Elsasser Still Intends to Contest for His Old Seat. MAY NOT GO TO HIGH COURT. Commissioners Will Recognize McDonald When the Board Meets January Fourteen—Elsasser May Appeal.

Henry S. McDonald, county commissioner-elect to succeed Peter B. Elsasser, probably will be elected chairman of the Board of County Commissioners when the board reorganizes January 14. Elsasser, who some weeks ago announced he would try to hold office for another year, may abandon that hope. He would have to fight to and through the supreme court in order to retain his seat and he is beginning to doubt the advisability of spending the money he would have to spend in a battle the result of which is gravely doubtful.

When asked for a statement Mr. Elsasser said he still intends to contest the seat in the courts, but close friends of his say he has almost decided to give up. Mr. Elsasser, however, will carry the fight as far as he can without incurring expense. When the new board meets January 14 he will appear in his seat.

ESTATE'S CREDITORS TO SUE ADMINISTRATOR'S BONDSMEN

Through the peculiar financial operations in which A. W. Walkup, attorney, engaged before he disappeared, G. A. Jenkins, administrator of the estate of the late Mrs. Mattie Lucas, is to be sued by creditors of the estate. More than two and a half years ago Jenkins employed Walkup as his attorney. He gave Walkup \$100 to pay the creditors. Now it is discovered the creditors never were paid and Walkup long since has gone to the port of missing men.

Attorneys for Bradley & Derrance and other creditors of the estate said they will sue Jenkins and A. W. Walkup, real estate dealer and brother of the lost attorney, A. W. Walkup being Jenkins' bondman. Any judgment recovered must be paid by Walkup, as Jenkins has no money with which to pay.

Mrs. Lucas was a poor woman. She left only a few dollars and an industrial insurance policy for which Jenkins endorsed the insurance company's check for the amount to Walkup who said he would pay the creditors. He then advised Jenkins that his services as administrator of the estate were completed and that he was discharged as administrator. Jenkins knew no difference until recently, when creditors, becoming impatient, called upon him for payment. In proof of the fact that Walkup procured the cash on the check the insurance company has produced the check bearing Walkup's endorsement.

SUIT ON NOTE BROUGHT IN THE WRONG WAY

A case of being "in the right church but in the wrong pew" occurred in the court of Justice Britt when G. C. Meisergurgan brought suit against Edward M. King for \$75.00 due on a note. Last Saturday the case was continued to Monday. When the judge learned a voluntary petition in bankruptcy had some time ago been filed in the federal court by King, and that the debt of \$75.00 was there listed, he decided that a Justice of peace had no jurisdiction in the matter of claims that were already listed with Uncle Sam in a bankruptcy case. He dismissed the case for want of jurisdiction. The facts showed that King in his bankruptcy petition had listed his debt of \$75.00 as owing to an insurance company as premium for his first year's insurance. Meisergurgan showed that as a matter of fact, he was the agent of that insurance company, and that he had personally advanced this premium money for King and had taken King's note for it payable to Meisergurgan personally. It will remain for the federal court and not the justice court to straighten the tangle.

OMAHA A CONVENTION CITY Thousands of Delegates Are Entertained During the Year. MORE FOR THE COMING YEAR Publicity Bureau Says It Uses Discrimination in Securing Conventions, Going After Only the Best.

According to E. V. Parrish, manager of the Commercial club publicity bureau, 18,115 persons were entertained at conventions during 1912. This number compares the registrations at thirty-eight conventions, representing organizations of almost every conceivable interest. Each convention lasted an average of three days, making 114 days of the 365 days, when nearly 60 persons from various parts of the United States saw and heard about Omaha. For the year 1913 the publicity bureau already has secured thirty-one conventions, the attendance at which will average a little more than the 1912 figure, according to conservative estimates. In this list several conventions which very likely will be held in Omaha are not listed because they are organizations whose executive committee or membership must vote upon the 1913 meeting place. In securing the conventions, the publicity bureau takes much care in their choice, not making any efforts to get those which will do the city no good

Council Approves Agreement for Gas on Dollar Basis Unanimously the city council approved the agreement reached between a committee appointed from the commission and officials of the gas company and will take final action on the compromise today. This compromise guarantees dollar gas for ten years if finally effected, and will give the people the opportunity to vote on an extension of franchise for ten, twenty or thirty years. It is understood the reduction in the price of gas will not be made until the franchise extension is voted on. Opposition to the extension of a franchise and to the ratification of the compromise developed when an attorney, member of the Omaha Economic League, announced that an association of business and professional men would fight the compromise before the election to extend the franchise, and in the courts afterward if necessary. The increased royalties provided in the agreement will net the city about \$20,000 a year over and above the sum now received annually as royalties.
