CITRUS FRUIT CROP IS LOST

Damage in Southern California Runs Into Millions, TEMPERATURE DROPS AGAIN Hundred Carloads of Oil Used in Smudging Without Effect—Half of Fifty Million-Dollar Crop Gone.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 7.—Temperature from 4 to 6 degrees lower than Sunday night were recorded last night, blasting the hopes of orange and lemon growers. Estimates of citrus fruit losses ran from \$10,000,000 to \$30,000,000 today and railroad freight losses, figured in terms of shipments were approximated in the statement of shippers that the 1913 crop of oranges and lemons would be from 16,900 to 20,000 carloads short.

Some Fruit Slightly Damaged. Actual losses to both growers and railroads, however, will be dependent to a certain extent upon the attitude of the government toward shipment of slightly damaged fruit.

W. A. Randolph, head of a big shipping concern, declared that if the government took the same attitude as it did in the "sweated fruit" cases, the present crop would be the smallest in the history of the citrus fruit industry. Oranges which had been subjected to the sweating process were confiscated by the government as adulterated food.

General Wood Favors Creation of Large Army of Reserves

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—In order that a reasonably strong reserve may be established in the United States with the least possible delay, all men who have served in the regular army, marine corps, in militia and are of proper age and physically fit should be authorized to enlist at once in the reserve and receive pay, in the opinion of Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the army.

SMALL RIOT GROWS OUT OF GARMENT WORKERS' STRIKE

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—The air was thick with bricks today when striking garment workers and employers who refused to join them fought in Cooper Square. About 400 strikers were involved. The police reserves dispersed the mob and arrested 75.

RUSSIAN CROWN PRINCE HELPS DISTRIBUTE GIFTS

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 7.—The Russian imperial crown prince, Alexei, with his father, today attended the distribution of gifts from the Christmas tree to the Cossacks of the bodyguard at the palace of Tsarskoe-Selo. This was the crown prince's first public appearance since his illness and disposed of the reports that he had been sent to the south of France.

NEW OIL REFINERY WILL BE BUILT IN CASPER

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Jan. 7.—(Special.)—The Midwest Oil company will build another refinery at Casper, Wyo., to cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000. The Hammond Iron works of Warren, Pa., has the contract and work will commence at once.

The capacity of the new plant will be 3,100 barrels per day. As the company will require considerably more land than it now possesses for a site for the new additional refinery, it is negotiating with Robert D. Carey, son of Governor Carey, for the purchase of land adjacent to its present holdings. The railway company will put in more trackage for the company, to handle the increased output.
