

SAVED MAN FROM FREEZING

Barking of Dog Calls Policeman's Attention to Sad Plight.

HANDS AND FEET ARE FROZEN

Fred Leopold, Farm Hand Residing Six Miles West of Fremont, Loses His Way and Falls in the Snow.

Through the incessant barking of a scruffy-haired dog at Twenty-fourth and Arbor streets, about 7 Tuesday morning Officer J. J. Pisanowski was able to probably save Fred Leopold, a farm hand, from freezing.

Pisanowski, who lives at 2339 South Twenty-fifth street, was going to work when he heard a dog barking. At first he paid no attention to it, but as he walked toward the car line the barking

grew more distinct and when he arrived at Twenty-fourth and Arbor streets he determined to find out what the cause of the canine's barking was. He had to walk but a few feet when he saw a man lying in a snowdrift a few feet from the sidewalk. The man was groaning as if in pain while the dog was standing a few feet away making a great commotion.

Going over to the man Pisanowski inquired of him what was the matter. But his only answer was a series of groans. He helped the man, who was advanced in years, to his feet, and it was then that the officer noticed the stranger's hands, which were frozen white. After much work and trouble Pisanowski managed to get the stranger to his home, from whence he telephoned for Police Surgeon Dawson. The latter after making an examination found that the man's feet and hands were frozen stiff.

For over an hour Dr. Dawson worked over the frozen man and was able to thaw out the frozen members. When re-

stored with spirits the man gave his name as Fred Leopold and said he lived about six miles west of Fremont, where he worked on a farm. He said he had attempted to visit a friend whom he knew, but could not find the house, and early in the morning crawled into a barn to sleep. It was so cold, however, that he walked down town and when near Twenty-fourth and Arbor streets he fell. He said he remembered nothing more after that. He had quite a sum of money on his person.

THROWS WIFE OUT IN STORM

Drunken Husband Returns Home at Early Hour and Mistreats Her.

HAD BOUGHT NEEDED FUEL

But He Intended Money for Other Purchases and Takes it as an Excuse for His Inhuman Behavior.

With the mercury hovering around zero and the icy wind making dangers of the falling snow, Sadie Stewart, wife of a University club waiter, walked scantly clad from her home at 127 South Sixteenth street to the Prague hotel at Thirteenth and William to call the police because her husband put her out of the house. The woman's bare feet were torn by sharp rocks on the way and the snow was stained with her blood. As she reached the hotel, she uttered a scream and fell to the sidewalk unconscious. She was brought into the place and warmed up and the police were called.

According to her story, she became ill in the afternoon while working at a dress-making parlor and went home. There was no coal and she purchased some with money given her by her husband for another purpose. When he learned of it at 3 o'clock yesterday morning he pulled her out of bed and chased her from the house, threatening her with a beating if she returned.

Stewart was arrested by Officers Emery, Lahof and Buford and is charged with "abusing his wife." The woman's feet were frozen and cut and Police Surgeon T. T. Harris had to work for nearly two hours to ease the pain. When found the woman was clad only in a night gown.

Government Asks for Lights Placed Near the Postoffice

Cadet Taylor, custodian of the federal building, has requested the city commission to install street lights at Seventeenth and Capitol avenues and Seventeenth and Dodge streets and Mayor Dahlman has been appointed a commission of one to correspond with Senator Hitchcock and ask him to use his influence in persuading the proper federal authorities to order ornamental lights placed on the post-office.

The city council approved the report of the committee of the whole on the dollar gas agreement. A bill is now being drafted for submission to the legislature at this session which will give the city commission power to enter into an

agreement with the gas company. According to this compromise the people will vote at a special election on extension of the company's franchise.

Price of gas is fixed in this agreement at one dollar per thousand cubic feet and the council given authority to reduce the rates at periods of ten years. The royalties paid the city are increased about \$20,000 a year.
