

MANLEY HEADS THE AD CLUB

Slate Nominated in the Open Meeting is Broken by Members. DIRECTORS ARE ALSO NAMED Twenty-Six Are Named Instead of Twenty-Four, as President and Vice President Were on the List.

The Omaha Ad club at the election of officers at the Paxton hotel yesterday turned down the scheduled candidate for president, Edward T. Swobe, who was nominated in open meeting some weeks ago, and elected Robert H. Manley over Swobe by a vote of 23 to 1.

When the nominations were made some weeks ago the names of ten of the members were placed in nomination on the floor for the office of president. Each and every one in turn declined to make the race until it came to Swobe, who accepted the nomination. While members maintain there was no slating and no work on the side lines, yet the fact remains that the name of Robert H. Manley was persistently written into the blank space left for a possible candidate on the ballot, and Swobe whose name was already there, was rejected with the result that he polled only eleven votes.

Samuel Rees, Jr., Secretary, C. A. Alden was elected vice president, G. T. Eastman was elected treasurer, Samuel Rees secretary and A. I. Croftin recorder.

Zimmerman, 51. There are twenty-four members of the executive board besides the president and vice president, who hold places on the board as ex-officio members. As the names of both these men appear on the ballot for executive members as well as for president and vice president it was necessary to declare twenty-six board members elected in order to have the necessary twenty-four besides president and vice president. There were thirty-eight candidates for places on the board.

The officers and board members elected are to hold a short term until June 1. In a previous meeting by a constitutional amendment the club changed its time of election to June 1, the amendment to take effect June 1, 1913.

E. Y. Parrish of the publicity bureau of the Commercial club reviewed the proposed bill to provide for an appropriation to establish a publicity bureau of the state. The plan was endorsed by the Ad club and a committee consisting of the newly elected officers of the club was appointed to work out the details of a bill along this line to be introduced in the legislature this winter.

Attorney E. C. Page Granted a Divorce

On a showing that his wife married him only to be supported and then be- litted him because he was not a wealthy and influential man and urged protective clients not to employ him, Ernest C. Page, well known Omaha attorney, was granted a divorce by Judge Howard Kennedy in district court.

Mrs. Page had filed an answer charging Page with extreme cruelty, but she did not attempt to defeat his plea for a divorce. The decree provided that she shall receive permanent alimony of \$1,700, payable in two installments of \$500 and additional installments of \$50 a month until the total has been paid.

Page, Mrs. Edith C. Carrier, Mrs. Alice S. MacFarland and I. Silberson were witnesses for the plaintiff. They testified in support of the allegations of Page's petition, saying that on divers occasions Mrs. Page told them she was disappointed in Page and that she had married him not because she cared particularly for him, but more for the reason that she thought him a successful and influential man.

Asks Pay for Being Bitten by Bulldog

When L. Phillipson was kind enough to let David E. Helkes ride in the back of his wagon last summer he laid the foundation for trouble for himself. The driver had a black bull dog running along behind the wagon, and said bull dog could not bear to see a pair of human legs dangling in a tantalizing manner over the end gate.
