Leading Industries Will Send Exhibits that Will Open the Eyes of Those Unfamiliar with Their Products.

Among the prominent merchant visitors in Omaha recently was E. J. Fisher of Hastings. Mr. Fisher is one of the Nebraska confectioners who has a large sale of his goods in Omaha.

Notwithstanding this Mr. Fisher has sold within the last few weeks 16,000 pounds of candy in one or two orders to Omaha firms, and he says that on the other hand a great deal of Omaha made candy is sold in his town.

"We are coming, not exactly 10,000 strong to the 'Made in Nebraska' show which is to be held in your city in the Auditorium in March, but we are at least going to send to you several thousand visitors, and also a thorough and comprehensive display of goods, showing just what we make in the central state manufacturing city of Hastings," said Mr. Fisher.

Five manufacturers of cigars and tobacco who will join and make an exhibit that will be a splendid illustration of Hastings leading cigar manufacturers. I myself will make a showing of fine candles and candy novelties and hope to bring here a very large candy model of our proposed new Hastings hotel. The Hager Candy company, one of the best in the west, will also make a splendid showing. S. C. Hankins & Sons, while not as large as some of the other broom manufacturers, are operating a number of machines and employing a good many men. They are putting out a pretty complete line of brooms, dusters, wash brooms, scrub brushes, etc. I understand that they are going to send, as part of the Hastings exhibit, a machine

and one of the very best skilled broom makers, and they will give out little sample brooms as novelties. Other Exhibits. "The Hastings Foundry and Iron company will have a splendid iron exhibit, which will include a miniature iron bridge. We have one very novel factory, known as the J. A. Ross & Son Hardware Specialty Manufacturing company. They make a line of novel hardware specialties. It is a new business and I am glad to say that their products are sold as far south as Texas, as far west as Denver and go east into Chicago. Mr. Ross is an enterprising man and is in hopes that the exhibit he is to make here will show to Omaha people that there are many lines of hardware goods manufactured in this state. "The leading brick and tile companies—Polenski Bros. company and the Western Brick and Supply company—will put up a large booth out of pressed and en-

amelled brick, together with tiling. Very little frame work will be used in this booth, and it will fittingly illustrate one of our leading industries. The Hastings Milling company will have an exhibit of flour and all sorts of mill products, including a specially prepared chicken feed, and also a cereal package goods display. Among those Mr. Kinney named there are several others I cannot recall at present who will join with us in this Hastings-made goods display. "We are also preparing some nice little novelties to give out. Our Commercial club will have booklets and similar publicity folders to dispense, and our newspapers are going to have reporters here who will make a special feature of the Hastings exhibit. At any rate, you fellows down here in Omaha will learn that Hastings is on the map as regards Nebraska-made goods," concluded Mr. Fisher smilingly.

if proper legislation can be secured during the present session of the state legislature, directors and officers of the Omaha National bank will organize another Omaha trust company. Plans have been under way for some time for the formation of the company, but owing to existing laws which President J. H. Millard of the Omaha National bank declares to be more antagonistic to such companies than the laws of any other state, the organization will be delayed until legislative changes can be made. "Just who are the promoters of the proposed new company, the bank has not

made public, but it is said that some of the largest property owners of the city and state are interested in the proposition. It is said that lawyers are at work now framing certain bills for introduction for passage at the present session of the legislature. 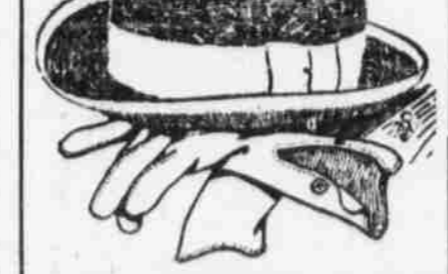
