Lack of Milliary Inventions.

One of the peculiarities of the season the absence of new suggestions which are ordinarily furnished to the military and naval authorities who have to do with the development of war material. Under the usual conditions, the bureau of ordnance of the Navy department and the army board of ordnance and fortification are plentifully supplied with suggestions from all imaginable sources Most of them are of no real value, and the average quality of the 200 propositions annually received is not worth much in the way of expert attention. The observers of the prevailing condition are at a loss to figure out the reason for this lack of material from a bitherto prolific source. They believe there must be an explanation, because there has been such a sudden and appreciable reduction in the supply. Perhaps the situ ation may be attributed to the international disturbances abroad and the fact that in that direction there is a chance for distinction and reward. Probably also those who are ingenious enough to device new methods of warfare also enterbelieve that the failure to obtain American acceptance will not diminish the chance of foreign adoption.
