I could not avoid remarking the universal courtesy with which I was received. In not one single instance was I given the frosty face; and in several cases proprietors or managers put aside their own work for a few moments to take a kindly interest in the desires of a stranger, and to give advice or offer suggestions as to where he would be most likely to obtain the desired employment. This is a most un-

usual state of affairs. "In many cities it is almost impossible for a person seeking employment to obtain a hearing at all and when he does he must approach the great man in fear and trembling, hat in hand and head bared, an apology on his lips for venturing into the presence of so much majesty. Then in nine cases out of ten he is met with a scowl and a 'how-dare-you-live' air, a gruff 'don't want you' and a slare which commands you to remove your contaminating presence quick.
