Atlantic Railroad Is Ordered Resold: Shaw Coin Forfeited

ATLANTIC, Ia., Jan. 14 .- (Special.)-The Atlantic Northern & Southern railread has been ordered resold. Judge in district court yesterday seclared forfeited all the money that former Governor Lealle M. Shaw has put into the road, since it was bid in a year ago last September by Colonel George W. Adams of the lowa & Omaha Short Line, the predecessor of the Shaw syndicate.

This money, amounting in all to \$57,540, has been paid to the receiver from time to time in order to secure postponements of the payment of the \$402,000 originally bid for the road, when the syndicate ould not, for one reason or another, sucseed in floating its bonds.
