Will Show One Good Road. Arrangements are practically completed for making use of a fifty mile stretch of highway in Boone and Story countl-s for the demonstration by the good roads department of the national Department of Agriculture to show what can actually be done in building permanent roads in lows. The department will furnish an engineer to direct the work and give \$10,000 toward the work. Local interests will contribute \$20,000 or more for the building of the road. Very likely a much larger sum will be contributed. The road selected is a part of what is called the "Transcontinental" road, intention is to use this as a sort of demenstration Job for Iowa in encouragement of good roads work.

Travelers Desire Chance to Vote. One of the first measures to be considered by the legislature will be a bill to provide that commercial travelers may cast their ballots while away from home. The state banking department has given charters to seven new banks organized under state laws since the first of the year. These are mainly small banks organized under suspices of some nearby bank, but two of the state banks were formerly private banks. Two more private banks are said to be ready to accept organization under state laws, The number of private banks is stendily decreasing and in case a law is passed which may be at this session of the legislature, to require private banks to make reports, they will soon all disappear.

Inheritance Tax for Schools. Persons who are working along the line of effort to secure better rural schools for lowa propose that a big fund to aid schools shall be raised by s direct inheritance tax and diversion of the collateral tax to that purpose. this way the state would have a fund for use in state aided schools. 


