

Nebraska PHONE HEARING GOES ON Wisconsin Expert Gives Opinion of Report of Nebraska Experts. AUTO CLUB INCORPORATES Omaha Organization Fixes Capital at Ten Thousand Dollars and Shares Are Fixed at Five Dollars Each Member.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The hearing before the railway commission on the Lincoln telephone matter is still grinding along slowly, with no chance of a finish this week. Today W. F. Sloan, an expert from the Wisconsin Railway commission, who has had experience in telephone matters in some of the large cities of the country, was on the stand and was closely questioned by members of the commission and the attorneys representing the reorganizers.

Mr. Sloan said that he thought the work of the physical valuation experts of the Nebraska commission was good and he could only criticize two items. One of these, the valuation of the pole lines, he thought was too high, and the valuation of the cable lines too low. He said it would take more than two years to put in a system such as the Lincoln company had and put it in operation.

**Omaha Club Incorporates.** If you want to join the Omaha Automobile club there are six requisites you must possess in order to get in on the organization roll, according to articles of incorporation filed with the secretary of state today. First, you must be white; second, you must be a male; third, you must be 21 years of age, and fourth, you must be of good moral character. When you have convinced some member that you are all of these, then you will have to buy a machine and get two members of the club to vouch for the other five qualifications. The club is incorporated for \$10,000 and upon payment of \$5 you will be given a share in the club. The incorporators are S. A. Searle, Gould Dietz, B. W. Jewell, C. S. Gould, W. B. Cheek, F. A. Wells, J. E. George and Harry Lawrie.

**Extradition Granted.** Extradition papers were granted this morning by Governor Morehead on request of the governor of Connecticut for the return to that state of Lynden C. Dickinson, wanted for the alleged theft of railroad tickets to the amount of \$30 from the station of the New Haven railroad at New London. Deputy County Attorney Hager of Lancaster county appeared at the hearing in behalf of T. F. Donnelly, an officer from Connecticut, while F. M. Terrell appeared for Dickinson.

**News Notes of Deshler.** DESHLER, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—The annual meeting of the Deshler Telephone company Monday showed the company out of debt and a cash balance of \$500 on hand. An annual assessment of \$5 was voted. Albert Gaudy was re-elected president and H. M. Harms secretary-treasurer.

The shipment of carlots of merchandise from Deshler during 1912 was 297 cars, as follows: Wheat, 71; corn, 41; hogs, 32; cattle, 52; hogs, 87; flour, 2; brooms, 32; miscellaneous, 8. There were 231 cars received as follows: Brooms, 25; coal, 51; lumber, 37; salt, 3; building material, 28; hay, 2; fruit, 4; grain, 1; agricultural implements, 12; immigrant goods, 1 wine and liquors, 25; miscellaneous, 25. There has been an increase of freight business over 1911 of \$1,619.57.

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—Christian F. Wutzger, aged 64, was found dead in his bed at his farm seven miles north of this city. He had recently been drinking to excess and while butchering yesterday said to his neighbors, who were assisting him, that he was tired of life. He also had threatened Mrs. Wutzger and a neighbor to kill them with strychnine, but it was not known that he had strychnine about the house and he arose some time during the night and took the poison. He was for many years an employee of the Union Pacific shops, but in recent years had been farming.

BEATRICE, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—Charles Miller, wanted for breaking and entering Smith's hardware store at Wymore, was arrested at Lincoln this afternoon by Sheriff Schick and lodged in jail here. A large number of lap robes, whips, etc., taken from the store were found in a barn at Wymore by the officers. Miller finished serving a three month sentence in jail here a month ago for stealing eggs from a boxcar at Wymore. He is 21 years of age.

Teconmeh Hotel Sold.

TECONMESH, Neb., Jan. 14.—(Special.)—Stewart Brothers' investment company of Teconmeh has traded the Hopkins hotel of this place to T. S. Baird of Elk Creek for the latter's farm adjoining Elk Creek. The farm includes 112 1/2 acres and is valued at \$12,000. The hotel property and equipment is valued at \$11,500. The investment company retains ninety-two feet of the lot occupied by the hotel which is to the north of the building.

STERLING PROGRESSIVE, AND GIVES HIS PLEDGE

PIERRE, S. D., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—Thomas Sterling, the Republican primary election nominee for the United States senate, today issued a signed statement that he is opposed to a third party organization and that if selected to the senate he will work with the progressive wing of the republican party, and not ally himself with any third party movement, which statement practically insures his selection on the first ballot.

The feature of today's session was the attempt on the part of Berg of Minnesota to force a resolution requiring the appropriation committee of both houses to report the general bill not later than the forty-fifth day of the session with a further provision that no appropriation should be included in the general bill for any department, which might be created by the present session. After a short debate this went over until tomorrow.

The house then took up contest matters and put in the discussion on the part of the attorney, the contest members and house members generally.

In the senate, resolutions were introduced for constitutional amendments of special interest to the western part of the state, one especially giving constitutional authority to the creation of irrigation districts. Another provides exemption from taxation for educational and church property.

Murder Case Nears End.

STURGIS, S. D., Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—All evidence in the Edwin South may murder case was concluded at 2 o'clock today. After examining expert witnesses, Drs. Howe of Deadwood and Brandt of Sturgis, counsel for the state then took up the argument, followed by counsel for the defense. Court adjourned until tomorrow morning, when arguments will be resumed. The case probably will go to the jury by noon.

NEBRASKA LUMBERMEN HERE Two Hundred Already Arrived, but More Are Expected.

IS ENTERTAINMENT MEETING No Serious Business Will Take Up Three Days Allotted Convention and Program Will Be One Primarily for Pleasure.

More than 200 lumber dealers of Nebraska have arrived in Omaha and registered at Hotel Rome for the twenty-third annual convention of the Nebraska Lumbermen's association, which was called to order at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon. It is expected, however, that the number will reach 300 before the books are closed.

Very little business will be taken up by the lumbermen at this convention, and the three days' program is made up mainly of entertainment features and addresses of a lighter vein.

W. H. Harrison of Grand Island, president of the association, expressed this plan in his annual address, which opened the first session. "I have to happily report," said he, "that this association is at peace within itself and with all the world." He then said that for the first time in years "not a cloud obscures its horizon, and no yellow perils are denouncing it as an unclean and unwholesome organization."

Women attending the convention will be treated to a number of entertainments. They were given a luncheon and a musicale at the hotel at noon. A theater party for them and their escorts, the lumber dealers, will be given at the Orpheum tonight.

The entertainment Wednesday will consist of a theater matinee party for the visiting women and a smoker and social for the delegates at the Commercial club in the evening. What is said to be the joker adjunct of the convention will be a meeting of the Hoop-Hoop Wednesday evening, at which "the vice regent" for Nebraska will be elected. This meeting will be a smoker.

Among the principal speakers before the convention are A. L. Bixby of the Nebraska State Journal, who gave some "Bixbyisms," and W. D. Fisher of Hayes, who talked on "Practical Advertising." E. R. Gurney of Fremont, whose subject is "Lumbering and Finance," and P. A. Good of Cowles, on "Cement and Its Possibilities for the Lumberman," will speak Wednesday afternoon.

CONVENTION IN MINNEAPOLIS Northwestern Association Opens its Annual Session.

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 14.—More than 900 members today attended the opening session of the annual convention of the Northwestern Retail Lumbermen's association here. W. R. Wood, president of the organization, made the opening address.

IOWA SALONS COUNT VOTES Governor Clarke Formally Called Executive of the State.

FEW CHANGES IN THE COUNT Executives Official Plurality Over Governor Carroll Was 1,000—Grover Davis Held Pending Day Investigation.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, Jan. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—The legislature in joint assembly decided who was elected governor of Iowa. The democrats made no contest, hence the task of going into the ballot boxes was not entered upon and the totals as received from the county officials were accepted. The vote was counted immediately after the message of Governor Carroll was read, and George W. Clarke was declared elected governor, with W. L. Harding lieutenant governor. Very few changes were found from the vote as it was reported informally. Clarke's plurality was 1,699.

**Police Hold Davis.** Grover Davis is in the city jail while the police are investigating the story of John Pruitt, his father-in-law, that Davis sought to kill his wife and then commit suicide a few days ago. Pruitt has a big cut on his cheek, which Davis says was self-inflicted.

**Will Show One Good Road.** Arrangements are practically completed for making use of a fifty mile stretch of highway in Boone and Story counties for the demonstration by the good roads department of the national Department of Agriculture to show what can actually be done in building permanent roads in Iowa. The department will furnish an engineer to direct the work and give \$10,000 toward the work. Local interests will contribute \$20,000 or more for the building of the road. Very likely a much larger sum will be contributed. The road selected is a part of what is called the "Transcontinental" road. Intention is to use this as a sort of demonstration job for Iowa in encouragement of good roads work.

**Travelers Desire Change to Vote.** One of the first measures to be considered by the legislature will be a bill to provide that commercial travelers may cast their ballots while away from home. At the last session of the legislature the day for the holding of the statewide primary was changed and it was provided that it be held on Monday so as to accommodate the travelers. But they desire a law under which they may cast their ballots at the general election without being at home on election day. This will be done by means of ballots prepared and mailed under seal to the local election officials in time to be counted. Members of the legislature believe it


