

MORE STRINGENT MILK LAWS

Inspector Bossie Makes Some Recommendations in Report.

WOULD RAISE THE STANDARD

Omaha Uses 9,500 Gallons of Milk a Day, of Which 4,000 Gallons is Pasteurized - Wants Milk Bottled at Depot or Farm.

Stringent legislation by the city commission to prevent the adulteration of milk, higher standard of milk in the city, more careful inspection of the milk supply of restaurants, heavier penalties for the violations of milk ordinances, some method by which dairy farms without the jurisdiction of the city, but which supply about 40 per cent of the city consumption, may be inspected; these are a few of the recommendations made to the health commissioner by Dairy Inspector Bossie in his annual report...

Commercial Club to Entertain Its Future Membership

Preparations are being made by the Commercial club to entertain the sons of its members at the evening of January 23 and it is probable that this will be one of the most unique affairs ever given by the club.

A banquet—one of the \$1.50 plate kind—will be tendered the boys and speakers chosen from the higher business men of the city who are still in sympathy with boyhood ideals and dreams will be on the program.

One of the rules for the dinner, as made by the entertainment committee, stipulates that each member attending must bring his son and someone else's son. But in order to supply those without sons, boys elected by the eighth grades of the thirty-five ward schools will be given "father-fathers" for the evening. Another rule is that all those attending the dinner shall "act like boys," eating everything placed before them and singing all songs as lustily as their lungs will permit them.

The boys' choir of Trinity cathedral will be a feature number of the program and the Junior Commercial club of the High School of Commerce will also participate. The purpose of the dinner and entertainment will be to interest the younger generation in the civic work now being conducted by their fathers. Acceptances received from some invitations show there will be three and four generations represented in many instances.

The committee which is preparing the entertainment is composed of Joseph Barker, Dean Tancock of Trinity cathedral, M. C. Peters, Superintendent of Schools E. U. Graff, G. F. West, Fred Paffenrath and J. M. Guid, commissioner of the Commercial club.

Ryder and McShane Join in Protest

WYOMING INDIANS STOP ENROUTE TO WASHINGTON

A party of three Arapahoe and three Shoshone Indians spent the day in Omaha enroute to Washington, D. C., where they go to represent their interests in some litigation pending there arising out of the proposed division of the Wind River reservation in Wyoming.

The party is in charge of Superintendent Joe Norris from the Wind River reservation, Jeffers and Tunison, attorneys in Omaha, will represent the Indians at Washington. George M. Tunison will accompany the party to the capital.

The Indians in the party are Thomas Christie, Lone Bear and Yellow Wolf of the Arapahoe tribe; and Dick Washakie, Charles Lahe and Joe LaJennesse of the Shoshone tribe. All are farmers on their own land on the reservation. They turn under irrigation and are "making good." Lone Bear has 900 acres of land in alfalfa. Dick Washakie is a son of the famous Chief Washakie, after whom the fort is named.

THIRD ATTEMPT SUCCESSFUL

Mrs. Hall, Married One Year, Ends Her Life with Acid.

QUARRELS WITH HER HUSBAND

When He Refuses to Go to the Store for Her She Diluted Carbolic Acid with Hot Water and Drinks It.

Because her husband refused to go to the store, a distance of a half block, for groceries, Mrs. E. E. Hall, 310 South Sixth street, drank an ounce of carbolic acid diluted in hot water yesterday and was successful in her third attempt upon her life since her marriage, one year ago. Police Sergeant Foltz worked over the woman fifteen minutes, but medical attention was useless. The acid being diluted in water and taken on an empty stomach was quickly absorbed, making Dr. Foltz's efforts to revive her unsuccessful.

The Halls have been married about a year. During this time Mrs. Hall had made two attempts to take her life, following quarrels with her husband, who is a night Union Pacific switchman.

Argument with Husband. Monday night Mrs. Hall purchased an ounce of carbolic acid, following an argument with her husband. In the morning when he returned home from work he had several drinks of beer with his father, who lives with him. Mrs. Hall objected to his drinking. Later she asked him to go to the store and when he refused, went into a bedroom and drank the deadly fluid.

Her screams attracted the attention of Hall's sister, Mrs. Hazel Reynolds, who found Mrs. Hall lying across the bed, unconscious, with the empty bottle by her side.
