Reducing bacteria standard to 100,000 per cubic centimeter from November 1 to May 1 annually and strict enforcement of this particular section of ordinance.

Requiring that milk for pastsurization contain not to exceed 1,000,000 bacteria before pastuerization and not over 50,000 after pastsurization and under no circum-stances should be pastuerized more than

Requiring that all pastuerising plants be equipped with an automatic recorder attached to the pastuerizer showing at all times the temperature at which said machine is being operated, and a correct report of said recorder being filed with the board of health daily.

I further recommend a heavier penalty in every instance for violation of any section of the milk ordinances.

In addition to the above, I sincerely recommend that all milk sold in restaurants, hotels, sods fountains for drinking purposes be in bottles sealed at milk depots or dairy farms and opened only in presence of consumer, an extra heavy penalty should be attched to this section as it is a well known fact that at least 35 per cent of the people of Omaha cat in hotels and restaurants daily and are entitled to above protection from a sanitary as well as quality standpoint.

Also that some method be adopted that will provide for the inspection of dairy farms supplying the creamery companies, as they distribute at least 40 per cent of the milk consumed, without any inspection whatever, as to saultary conditions.

I also recommend that the sale of milk bottles by Junk mon and individuals other than dealers be prohibited, if such can be made possible.
