LINCOLN, Jan. 16.-(Special.)-In response to an opinion propounded to At torney General Martin by State Auditor-Howard on the time the legislative raise in salaries by constitutional amendment goes into effect, the attorney general has written a letter, in which he says:

All the constitutional and statutory pr All the constitutional and statutory provisions governing the submission, the canvassing of votes and the issuing of the proclamation relating thereto seem to have been fully compiled with. When the governor of the state duly proclaimed said amendment to have been legally said amendment to have been legally adopted and declared the same a part of the constitution, that instant it became a part of the fundamental law of the state part of the fundamental law of the state.
Section 4. article 3. constitution, as it stood prior to the adoption of the amendment, fixed the salaries of members of the legislature at 35 per day, whereas the amendment fixed the pay of each member at the rate of \$600 for each regular session. The first sentence of the newly adopted section relates to and fixes the terms of the members of the legislature at two years. In the original constitution the term was fixed the same as in the new.
