The Omaha Alumni association of the University of Nebraska Thursday night edopted a resolution endorsing the recomnendation of regents of the university for removal of the several colleges of the school from the present campus in Lincoln to the state farm, at the annua meeting of the local organization, held in the University club quarters,

Considerable discussion of the resolution took place before its adoption, and only two men-both Omaha members of the executive committee of the Nebraska State Alumni association, which recently went on record against removal-were heard to protest against the proposed endorsement of the well considered act of the regents and the chancellor. Many Omaha alumni spoke on the subject, and all, with the two exceptions, Dean Ringer and H. F. Leavitt, spoke soundly and enthuslastically for the removal.

Officers Also Chosen. Officers for the ensuing year were lected, and a motion to have the offiers and board of directors decide upon s plan for getting a vote of all the lumni of the university living in this dufe, on the removal question, was passed. The officers selected were: Frank Yoodland, who was given a second term as president; Robert Manley, vice presient. Clyde E Elliott, secretary: Robrt Switzler, treasurer; Dr. W. P. Wherry, Dr. John M. Betts, William C. Ramsey, E. Foster and Alvin Johnson, directors Lincoln papers were represented by resorters. 


