OPEN NEW RALSTON FACTORY

Commercial Club Men Visit Omaha Furniture Manufacturing Co. FIFTY AT WORK IN BIG PLANT Hotel and Lodge Room Furniture, as Well as that for Home, Being Made--Howard Works Visited.

Omaha dedicated another of its big manufacturing plants yesterday, the Commercial club placing upon it the stamp of approval and officially starting the machinery moving. The plant is that of the Omaha Furniture Manufacturing company at Ralston, Omaha's newest and one of its most thrifty suburbs.

Organized last summer with a capital stock of \$100,000, all paid in and most of the buildings is about one-half glass, this affording workmen an abundance of light and plenty of air, as the windows are hung at the centers and swing in and out.
