**FREE RIDES FOR OFFICIALS**

Representative Foster of Douglas County Introduces Measure.

**PENSION BILL IS ADVANCED**

Simon Measure to Pay Widows of Omaha Policemen Twenty Dollars a Month is Recommended for Passage.

(From a Staff Correspondent.)  
LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 31.—(Special Telegram)—Representative Foster of Douglas county introduced a bill this morning providing that all state officers and supreme and district court judges, except lieutenant governor shall be entitled to ride free upon trains when traveling on state business. They are required to carry a card signed by the secretary of state which shall be honored by conductors.  
Representative Sugarman introduced a comparable judiciary bill. The house this morning recommended for passage the Simon bill to pension widows of Omaha policemen at not less than \$20 a month.  
McKiesick of Gage introduced a bill appropriating \$10,000 for an exhibit at the San Francisco exposition, the governor to appoint a commission of three members to serve without pay.  
**Direct Election Bill Reported.**  
The proposal to ratify the federal constitutional amendment for direct election of United States senators was today reported to the house of representatives.

A bill to repeal a law passed two years ago providing that grain tests should be made from a vertical section through a bin or crib in buying and selling grain was killed by a vote to the house.

**NEW BILLS OF ALL KINDS**

**House Bills Number Five Hundred Seventy So Far.**  
(From a Staff Correspondent.)  
LINCOLN, Jan. 31.—(Special.)—The following bills were introduced in the house today:  
H. R. 531, by Brou, Hasik and Ayers—Provides for county fair demonstration on petition of 5 per cent of the freeholders of any county.  
H. R. 532, by Hasik of Butler—Prohibits the use of the name "University of Nebraska" by any school not affiliated with the University of Nebraska.  
H. R. 533, by Chapman of Douglas—Provides for registration of land titles; simplifies transfer of property.  
H. R. 534, by Greider of Thayer—Provides for annulling the charter of corporations found guilty of unfair discrimination.  
H. R. 535, by Regan of Platte—Provides for credit of 10 per cent on every person who votes at primary and general elections.  
H. R. 536, by Regan of Platte—Provides for poll tax of \$2.50 yearly for every male person between 21 and 30.  
H. R. 537, by Foster of Douglas—Permits issuance of railroad passes to the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer, supreme judges, district judges, state and county commissioners and other state officials when traveling on public business.  
H. R. 538, by Druzesdow of Douglas—Increases salaries of clerks in register of deeds office in Douglas county.  
H. R. 539, by Smith of Douglas—Provides penalty for selling meat under other than its right name.  
H. R. 540, by Smith of Douglas—Appropriates \$5,000 for the relief of Mrs. Josephine Mitchell of Douglas county, prisoner in the Hastings hospital for the insane.  
H. R. 541, by Burket of Lancaster—Empowers State Railway Commission to regulate the service of street railway companies.  
**Assessment Amended.**  
H. R. 542, by Smith of Douglas—Provides for annual assessment of real estate on April 1 in each year.  
H. R. 543, by Smith of Douglas—Empowers the State Railway Commission to regulate and fix rates for electric light and power companies.  
H. R. 544, by Hines of Gove—Provides for the payment of taxes on personal property omitted from assessment.  
H. R. 545, by Hines of Gove—Reduces fine for selling liquor to drunkards or mentally incompetent.  
H. R. 546, by Hubbard of Adams—Permits mutual fire, light and tornado insurance companies to do business in Nebraska.  
H. R. 547, by Lee of Douglas—Empowers cities to prohibit distribution of literature respecting public matters and candidates or officers.  
H. R. 548, by Lee and Davis of Douglas—Places fine, from \$20 to \$100, for sale of certain drugs and caliche cures except upon physician's prescription.  
H. R. 549, by Baker of Thomas—Provides for licensing of pool and billiard tables and bowling alleys outside of cities and villages in county board.  
H. R. 550, by Baker of Thomas—Liquor license law to be published in newspapers and in Omaha in a daily newspaper.  
H. R. 551, authorizing—Applies the penalties for aiding prisoners to escape to those of other states or offending against the United States. The present law limited to prisoners violating the law of this state.  
H. R. 552, by Anderson of Boyd—Provides that husband or wife is incapable of testifying against the other if the husband may be transferred by the other that is sane.  
H. R. 553, by Gustafson of Saunders—Gives State Board of Irrigation the right to advise with county boards on roads and bridges and requires county boards to make their plans conform to those of the state board.  
H. R. 554, by Lardin and Mather—Pitt jurors must be drawn twenty days before a session instead of ten and notice must be sent out by registered letter fifteen days before the opening of the session.

**Elective Liability Bill.**

H. R. 549, by Bollen of Knox—An elective workmen's compensation and employers' liability bill. The minority bill of the commission appointed by Governor Aldrich.  
H. R. 550, by Bollen of Knox—Provides an optional employers' mutual liability insurance association, provided twenty or more employers hiring 500 or more workmen join. Board of directors fix the rates and the rules for payment.  
H. R. 551, by Bollen of Knox—Establishing a commission of investigation of industrial accidents, causes and prevention, composed of the labor commissioner, two employers, two employees, one representative of the public and one skilled investigator, appointed by governor with no compensation but actual expenses.  
H. R. 552, by Hostetler and Harris of Buffalo—Provides that the subjects of food and diet be added to the common school curriculum in the eighth, ninth and tenth grades.  
H. R. 553, by Sugarman of Douglas—Provides for nonpartisan nomination and election of county, district and supreme court judges.  
H. R. 554, by Elmendorf of Saunders—Makes universal provision for 20 per cent reserve by all state banks in cities of more than 2,500 population.  
H. R. 555, by Elmendorf of Saunders—Permits county superintendents, county clerk and county board to change school district boundaries of any district containing less than six sections of land where school consists of at least ten grades.  
H. R. 556, by Elmendorf of Saunders—Permits law requiring counties to pay for board and care of insane patients in state asylums.  
H. R. 557, by Jarry of Lancaster—Authorizes 3-mill levy for park improvement in Lincoln; removes limit of \$5,000 expenditure per year; power vested in city council.  
H. R. 558, by Lancaster County Delegation—Appropriates \$25,000 for F. P. Kenward, 50 per cent of amount collected from United States government in 1921, claim due by virtue of contract with Governor Edwards.  
**School District Bonds.**  
H. R. 559, by Gustin of Cass—Raises limit of bonds from \$500 to \$10,000 in school districts having 100 to 250 children.  
H. R. 560, by Elwood of Antelope—Appropriates \$5,000 to build and maintain a state hatchery for game fish in Antelope county on north branch of Verdigris creek.  
H. R. 561, by McCarthy of Cuming—Repeals law requiring counties to pay for up to 500 pounds.  
H. R. 562, by Van Dusen of Washington—Provides that a monetary penalty for each pocket opened, paid by state, appropriate \$200.  
H. R. 563, by Lancaster Delegation—

**Appropriates \$2,500 to reimburse Sheriff Hyers for defense in Roy Blunt murder trial.**

H. R. 564, by Nichols—County seats to be changed by three-fifths vote; when county seat in one town over ten years, takes three-fourths.  
H. R. 565, by Nichols and Regan—Appropriates \$7,000 for constructing hospital for made patients at Norfolk asylum.  
H. R. 566, by Nichols and Regan—Appropriates \$20,000 for additional land at Norfolk asylum.  
H. R. 567, by McKiesick—Appropriates \$150,000 for a Nebraska building at Panamanian Francisco exposition; governor to appoint a commission of three.  
H. R. 568, by Backner of Lancaster—Requires all private business colleges and commercial departments of other schools to secure permit from state superintendent, forbids canvassing for pupils or to make contracts for tuition without securing permit; requires superintendent to notify all public officers forty days before granting permit; may refuse permit for specific reasons: penalty, \$100 to \$500 fine or sixty days in jail.  
H. R. 569, by Pearson of Frontier—Appropriates \$5,000 to the Rees-Heaton collection of birds and animals.  
H. R. 570, by Pearson of Frontier—Provides for experimental exhibits and demonstrations by agricultural experiment stations to be made at county fairs; appropriates \$5,000.  
**New Senate Files.**  
S. F. 259, by Wink of Buffalo—Provides for establishment of domestic animal fund for abatement of losses caused by dogs or wolves.  
S. F. 260, by Housland of Lancaster—Gives state board of irrigation, highways and drainage authority to require interstate canal companies to provide measurement works for ditches. Also provides for appeals from decisions of the drainage board.  
S. F. 261, by Housland of Lancaster—Declares pocket gophers a nuisance and provides for their destruction.  
S. F. 262, by Housland of Lancaster—Provides for play ground and park extension in city of Lincoln.  
S. F. 263, by Dodge of Douglas—Gives municipalities of state right to prevent circulation of advertising or other literature that is indecent.  
S. F. 264, by Dodson of Douglas—Authorizes the incorporations and makes same exempt from taxation as cemetery associations.  
S. F. 265, by Grossman of Douglas—Provides that notices of applications for liquor licenses in Omaha be published for two weeks in any daily paper published in Omaha.  
S. F. 266, by Grossman of Douglas—Reduces the number of presenters' challenges allowed both defendant and the state in criminal cases.  
S. F. 267, by Brookley of Clay—Allows town treasurers \$5 a year compensation instead of 3 per cent of taxes collected by him.  
S. F. 268, by Marshall of Lancaster—

**Relieves banks that are depositories for other state banks from reserve provisions of state banking law.**

S. F. 269, by Hummel of Webster—Relates to county seat removal law and states with regard to the temporary provision the words "prior to the passage and approval of this act."  
S. F. 270, by Krumbach of Polk—Abolishes the board of pardons and the state prison board and vests the powers in the board of control for state institutions.  
S. F. 271, by Bushbee of Kimball—Provides that state irrigation and drainage board shall counsel with county officials in expenditures of all funds provided by the state or federal government for construction of highways or bridges.  
S. F. 272, by Ollis of Valley—Provides for creation of an industrial accidents commission of seven members of two years each. Labor commissioner to be the secretary of the commission. Report to be given to thirty-fourth session of legislature. Expenses, but no compensation for commission.  
S. F. 273, by Ollis of Valley—Provides for incorporation and operation of employers' mutual liability insurance associations.  
S. F. 274, by Ollis of Valley—Workingmen's compensation and employer's liability measure providing for an elective system of insurance.
