No Rall Standard.

There are many reasons why the golf ball cannot be made of a certain standard, at least at the present time, it is that size, weight, and marking might be defined, but it is common knowledge that even subject to these limitations different makers would produce widels' different results, and if two players were each using balls of different manufacture they would be using balls to all purposes entirely different, so that neither would be playing what could fairly be called a standard ball.

It might be suggested that the limitations be carried further and include material and construction, such as a hard, solid center of a given size, and with a cover of a certain thickness. Under these conditions it is urged that the balls would become inferior to those at present on the market, while the cry is not for an inferior ball, but for one of a certain stand-
