GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Bull Reports Being Sent Out on Southwestern Wheat Situation.

SCALPERS RECOUPING LOSSES

General Trend of Prices is to Lower Levels, Corn Dropping Off One-Half and Oats Remaining Unchanged.

OMAHA, Feb. 3, 1913.

The wheat market at Chicago may now be said to have veered around into debatable territory. While the cash market continues to show that may be overbalanced by claims of crop losses in the southwestern states, the market for the trade taking stock in the unfavorable crop reports which are likely to be poured into the wheat pit, the situation will develop so that the big question will develop as to whether the market will be able to control the market changes without a great effort. The longs in May wheat have suffered losses because of a decline in price, but the short position has been about the same in the running as sellers have been in the running, as buyers have recovered part of their losses. The average commission man is anxious to see the wheat market gain some momentum in the matter of activity as well as price change. There is little profit to be gained from a purely professional trade and this has been about all that has been seen for many weeks. The farm is always willing to take a chance in a crop market when there is anything in the situation that he discovers is encouraging to a buyer. With big stocks of wheat in storage, conditions and with no outlet at the present, he may have no claim for their conviction. A moderate reduction in wheat after the recent advance is to be expected, especially as the weather remains milder and the world's shipments continue last week was very large.

The oats market continues dull, moving sideways, with wheat and corn. Cash oats unchanged.
