CGUNT THIRD WARD VOTES

Contest Committee of Senate Decides to Take Matter Up.

PANCOAST GAINS EIGHTY-TWO

Second Precinct Re-count Shows the Election Board Did Not Give Accurate Return of the Vote as Cast.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—The special committee selected by the senate to hear the evidence in the Pancoast-Grossman contest from Douglas county, after consideration, decided to open the ballots of the second precinct of the third ward of Omaha and examine them.

The result of a count of the second precinct of the third ward of Omaha and examine them. The result on a count of the ballots showed that Pancoast had received 50 straight republican votes and 41 progressive votes, giving him 91, a gain of 32 votes over the count given him by the election board of that precinct. The same count showed that Senator Dodge, who was given six votes by the election board, received the same number as Pancoast in the count today and Senator Saunders, who was given eleven votes by the election board, received also the same number.

County Clerk Dewey of Douglas county, testified that the ballots in the condition they were shown today were the same as they were considered by him when delivered at his office the morning after election, the seals being the same as were placed on the packages by himself or his deputy.

GRAND ISLAND TRAINMEN CENSURE COMMERCIAL CLUB

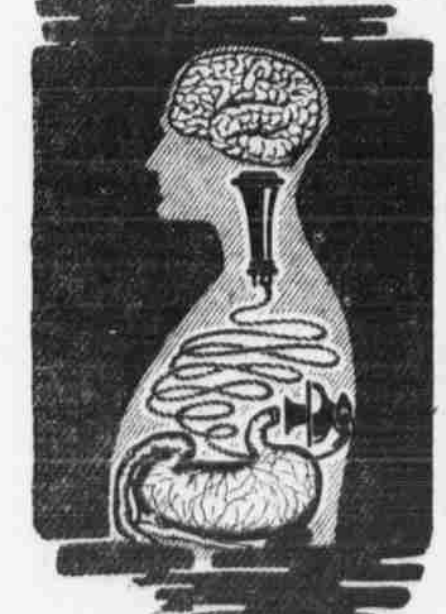

REAPPORTIONMENT PLAN TO GERRYMANDER STATE

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 4.—(Special Telegram.)—A democratic reapportionment bill with republican support is being prepared for introduction in the house and possibly in the senate. It is probable Krumbach will father the measure in the upper house. The identity of the house member has not been disclosed.

The proposed bill puts Congressman Dan Stephens, S. R. Barton and Charles Sloan in one district, the Fourth. The First takes over Gage and the Second remains the same. Under the bill as prepared the Third district loses Dodge, Colfax, Merrick and Nempe counties and gains Holt, Boyd, Garfield, Wheeler and Greeley.

MAN WHO MARRIED GIRL COUSIN ACQUITTED

AUBURN, Neb., Feb. 4.—(Special.)—The jury returned a verdict of not guilty in the case of the state against Alfred Bohling, who was charged with having committed a statutory offense in April, 1911, against his cousin, Dollie Hager of Stella, who would not be 14 years of age until the following November. In December of 1911, Bohling was tried in the district court at Auburn, and was sentenced to six years in the penitentiary.

(Continued from Page One.) Turkish armies concentrated at those places.

It is possible the allies may attack one or both of these positions. If they could clear Gallipoli of Turkish troops and attack the Dardanelles straits, this would give free passage to the Greek fleet, which then would be able to render some assistance at Tchaikta. On the other hand the winter season is so unfavorable for offensive operations that the allies may decide to let the Turks make the first move from Tchaikta.

The Ottoman army at Tchaikta has greatly improved during the armistice. The soldiers are better armed than they were, sickness among them has diminished, supplies have been brought up in great quantities and fresh troops now man the strings of powerful forts.
