### Withnell Wants New Fire Hose for City

City Commissioner Withnell says the fire department needs 30,000 feet of new fire hose, and has recommended to the city commissioners that at least 10,000 feet be purchased at once, for it is his opinion that in case of a severe fire the department would be so crippled that it would be difficult to prevent a general conflagration.

At all recent fires the firemen have been hampered by bursting hose. About 7,500 feet of hose is in condition to stand engine pressure, but the remainder of the 35,625 feet owned will burst when more than the ordinary pressure from the mains is applied.

Manufacturers' guarantees have expired on all hose now owned by the city. The hose now in use was purchased as follows: 2,500 feet in 1904, 10,000 feet in 1906, 10,000 feet in 1907, 2,500 feet in 1909, and 5,000 feet in 1911. This hose costs about \$1.10 per foot.
