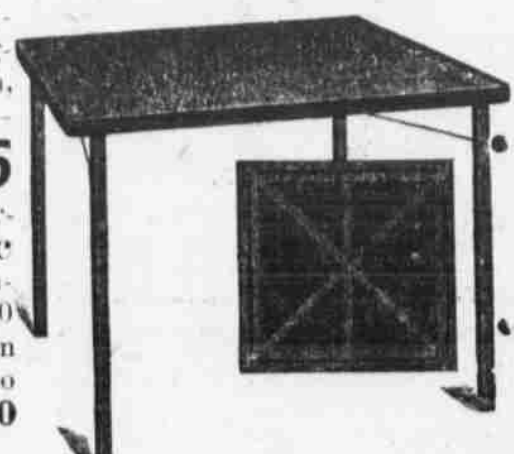

FEEDING CONTRACT WAR ON
Sheriff's Men and Commissioners Fight for Advantage.
GAS AND WATER ARE WEAPONS
Foster Has Gas Drawn Into Kitchen and Commissioners Have It Cut Off—Prisoners Fed from Restaurants.
 After another day's maneuvering the Board of County Commissioners still holds the advantage in the strategic war with Sheriff Felix J. McShane, Jr.'s office over feeding of county jail prisoners. While the sheriff's office is feeding the prisoners it is unable to use the county's kitchen in preparing food and the meals still are being fetched in from a restaurant.
 Velled threats of imprisonment and complaint to the federal authorities have reached the commissioners, but they show no disposition to withdraw from the fight.
 Deputy Sheriff W. A. Foster, who was left alone to direct the sheriff's end of the fight, said probably no further effort to use the kitchen will be made until the sheriff's return from Memphis, where he went to testify in United States court against Ernest Nolen, charged with attempting to liberate Diggs Nolen, a federal prisoner, from the Douglas county jail.
 County Commissioner John C. Lynch, chairman of the county building and jail committee, said the county commissioners are willing to be reasonable with the sheriff and will allow him the use of the county's kitchen if he will feed the prisoners at 19 cents a day; but the board will not permit the use of the kitchen so long as the sheriff proposes to charge 50 cents a day a prisoner.
Gives Up Trying.
 When the county commissioners shut off the gas supply from the kitchen Deputy Sheriff Foster, in the name of Sheriff McShane, contracted for gas with the gas company; the company installed a meter and gas was turned into the kitchen; but the commissioners immediately caused the gas supply to be cut off again. The commissioners hold the kitchen is not a part of the jail and neither the gas company nor any other party has the right to put gas into the kitchen without permission of the board.
 Foster gave up trying to get gas. The commissioners have shut off the water supply from the kitchen, anticipating an attempt of the sheriff's forces to bring in oil stoves and use the county's water in preparing meals.
 James J. Canill intimates that Joseph M. Calabria, county building superintendent, may be arrested for turning off gas and water from the kitchen, but Sheriff Foster said nothing of the kind was contemplated. It was intimated also that Calabria had federal prisoners in the county jail were about to appeal to the United States government for protection against interference with the sheriff's feeding them; this Foster also denied.
Fed from Restaurants.
 "They are well fed and will be well fed," said Foster. "It is costing us a good deal, but nobody is going to go hungry. There are plenty of stoves and food in the city."
 Foster admitted being sick of the feeding war.
 County Commissioner Lynch today said:
 "When the sheriff caused a bid to be put in for prisoner feeding it was for 19 cents a day. Now we don't want to be unreasonable. The sheriff had no

right to oust the feeding contractors until the forty days allowed for a rehearing in the supreme court had passed, but we are willing to let that pass. We will let the sheriff use the kitchen from now until the feeding matter is finally settled in the courts or by the legislature if he will feed the prisoners for 19 cents a day each, in accordance with his bill. Or we will let him use the kitchen and charge 50 cents a day if he will pay us 3 cents a day per prisoner for the use of the kitchen.
 "If the sheriff has his way it will cost the taxpayers about 45 a day more for feeding prisoners than if he charged 19 cents, the price he bid and would have been glad to get a contract for. The county put that kitchen in there for the purpose of saving the county \$10,000 a year on feeding and not to enable the sheriff to make \$10,000 a year more by feeding, a difference of \$25,000 a year to the taxpayers. The sheriff has no business at all in the kitchen and he and his deputies are trespassers on the county whenever they are in there."

NEW MOVE MADE TO FORCE MRS. MARSH TO PAY CLAIMS
 Another move to force Mrs. Gertrude V. Marsh, widow of the late Charles Marsh, to pay claims against her husband's estate was made in county court by the Merchants National bank and trustee E. Shaker, creditors of the estate. They ask that Mrs. Marsh be cited to appear and show why she should not be ordered to pay their claims and others.
 Mrs. Marsh is guardian of her minor child, Gertrude J. Marsh, and also administratrix of her husband's estate. For herself and as guardian of her child Mrs. Marsh recently received a legacy of more than \$100,000 from the estate of William W. Marsh, her husband's father. The plaintiffs in the present action contend Mrs. Marsh as herself and as guardian of her child should turn over to herself as administratrix enough money to pay the claims.
 A similar action is pending in district court. The plaintiffs brought the new action to gain a more speedy hearing. County Judge Crawford set February 27 as the date for hearing on the application to cite Mrs. Marsh to show cause.
