BONHAG'S EFFORT IS SURPASSED RAILROADS ENJOY PROSPERITY

ty-Five Feet by Ryan, Benting Record Which Has Stood Twenty-Five Years.

NEW YORK, Feb. 7.-Hannes Kolchmainer of Finland, the Utympic distance champton, starting from scratch in a five-mile handicap at the indoor games of the Irish-American Athletic club in Madison Square garden tonight, made an American indoor record for the distance, as well as new records for three and one half miles and four and one-half miles. Kolchmainen's time for the five miles was 24:48, 0:11% better than the record made by George Bonhag in 1909.

At three and one-half miles he had aleady bettered by 0.1% the previous record of 17:17%, and although he was slightly behind the record figures at four miles. he had shot ahead again at four and one-half miles, which he made in 22.17, or 0:13% faster than the old mark. Hoto these records also had been held by Bon-

A new world's record of 25 feet in putting the fifty-six-pound shot with follow was made by Patrick Ryan of the Irish-American Athletic club. The former record. 23 feet 11 inches, was made by William Real at Boston October 4, 1888. A special 1,090-yard run was won by Abel R. Kiviat in 2:17%. Melvin W. Sheppard was second.

No important change has taken place in the business situation during the last week. The leading industries and trades are still prosperous and the undercurrent of conservatism that exists in some quarters has not retarded to any measurable extent the steady broadening of industrial and metcantile activity.

The Balkan situation has caused some financial strain abroad and part of the heavy European gold requirements have

financial strain abroad and part of the heavy European gold requirements have been shifted to this side. This, in connection with the demands occasioned by our increasing domestic trade, has imparted a slightly firmer tone to the money market.

The open winter, while somewhat unfavorable to retail trade, has afforded a stimulus to various branches of industry. Building and aliled lines, for example, have been generally active and the unusual weather has added materially to the already large traffic of the railroads, whose gross earnings during four weeks of January increased 13.9 per cent.
