

CLAIMS FOR EXTRAS HEARD

Latenser Declares He Will Never Approve Some of Them.

DECLARES HE HIRED AN EXPERT

Protects County Against Charges that Some of the Riveting Was Not Being Properly Done

Caldwell & Drake's extra charge of \$600 for an extra three inches of concrete on the county building roof was declared unwarranted by John Latenser, county building architect, at the conference of the county commissioners and Caldwell & Drake, county building general contractors.

Mr. Caldwell said three inches more of concrete than was specified was required on the county building roof to cover steel beams. Mr. Latenser said that while the specifications in one paragraph called for a certain number of inches of concrete, another paragraph required all beams to be covered, regardless of the amount of concrete required. The board deferred action on this claim.

Riveting Improperly Done. It was regarding the Caldwell & Drake claim of \$25 for replacing brick work torn out to inspect riveting that Mr. Latenser mentioned his private inspection. When union iron workers were fighting Caldwell & Drake, they charged certain riveting was improperly done. Mr. Latenser said he ordered the brick work torn out that the riveting might be examined. It was found to be satisfactory. "I anticipated that some time in the future these same charges would be revived," said Mr. Latenser. "There he related the story of his employment of experts who will swear, if occasion requires, that the work was not defective. Action on this claim was deferred.

Action was deferred on a claim of \$254 for extra woodwork and on a \$110 claim for dust-proof pans for the elevators. There is some question as to whether the county or the Otis Elevator company should pay the latter. Mr. Caldwell withdrew a claim of \$182 for additional steel skylight support. William H. Morrow, of the Fidelity and Deposit Co. of Maryland, the contractors' surety, said he authorized Caldwell & Drake's men to make certain changes in steel work for elevator shafts, for which Mr. Caldwell claimed \$500. Mr. Morrow said he would settle with Caldwell & Drake for that.

Knights Will Not Permit Pickens and Barker to Quit

Unless Charles H. Pickens and Joseph Barker can give very good reasons to the Ak-Sar-Ben board of governors Monday night, their resignations will not be accepted. Both have written resignations and submitted them to their fellow members for action at the Monday night meeting. Charles H. Pickens says his health is becoming poor and business duties will not permit him to continue with the knight's governing body. C. R. Black and Charles Courtney are said also to desire to resign, but influence of other members is against them. The terms of Arthur D. Brandeis and W. L. Yetter expire this winter, but they will undoubtedly be re-elected, say the members.

City of Omaha Mixed in Much Litigation

City Attorney Rine has reported to the city commission the number of cases handled by the legal department during the year 1912. At the beginning of the year 128 cases were pending, sixty-four were filed, seventy-nine were disposed of and 111 are now pending. This is a status of the heaviest litigation for a number of years as far as the city is concerned. The number of cases disposed of is greater than for several previous years.

MUFF TAKEN AT CARD PARTY RETURNED BY PARCEL POST

While Miss A. Smith, 348 North Twenty-second street, was at a card party at the home of Mrs. William M. Kenna, Twentieth and Emmet streets, her muff was taken by one of the guests. The fur is valued at \$100 and was returned to Miss Smith yesterday by parcel post. When the gathering broke up Miss Smith discovered the loss of her muff. A hurried search of the house failed to reveal the valuable fur. All the guests present had seen Miss Smith put it down and could not account for its sudden disappearance. Miss Smith advertised the loss in the paper, stating no questions would be asked if it was returned to her within a week. Today the mail man delivered the stolen article at the Smith home. Investigation, which the police have been conducting, has been stopped upon request of Miss Smith. She says she is satisfied to recover her property and does not want to bring the guilty party to justice.

POLICE SEEK MAN WHO PASSED WORTHLESS CHECK

Police and private detectives in every large city in the United States are searching for a man giving the name of J. O. MacMillan, who on January 21 obtained \$125 from the Home hotel on a worthless check. County Attorney George A. Magney filed a complaint against MacMillan, charging forgery, in district court and warrants for the man's arrest were issued.

MacMillan posed as an agent for Elias Doer & Carroll, New York City horse dealers, and was a guest of the hotel for several days. Departing, he tendered what purported to be the horse dealers' check against the Mercantile National bank of New York City, for \$125, salary and expenses. It was an old check, for the bank had been out of existence for months.

Sunday Dinner Menu and Tested Recipes

Ham Toast.
Mix with one tablespoonful of finely chopped ham the beaten yolk of an egg and a little milk. Heat over the fire without boiling and spread over thin buttered toast. Sprinkle with minced celery if desired.

Nut Bread.
One-half cupful of sugar, one egg, one teaspoonful salt, one and one-quarter cupfuls of milk, four cupfuls of sifted flour, four level teaspoonfuls baking powder, one cupful of chopped nuts. Beat egg, add sugar, then flour, which has been sifted with salt and baking powder alternately with milk, then nuts. Allow to stand in warm place twenty minutes and bake in moderate oven forty minutes.

Water Lily Salad.
For each individual use hard boiled eggs; when cooked let stand in cold water until cool enough to handle; peel, slice in strips one-quarter inch wide, leaving the yolk to stand in center; set on lettuce leaves and serve with French dressing. This is delicious as well as "artistic."

Stewed Carrots.
One quart cut carrots, one tablespoonful finely chopped onion, two tablespoonfuls butter, one tablespoonful flour, one teaspoonful chopped parsley, one teaspoonful salt, one-quarter teaspoonful white pepper will be needed. Wash, scrape and cut the carrots into pieces one inch long. Put on to boil with water enough to cover, boil until tender without a cover. Drain and save the water in which they were cooked. Put the butter into saucepan, melt, add the flour, mix well, add one cup of the carrot water slowly, mix the carrots and sauce and add the salt, pepper and parsley; cook three minutes.

Jellied Prunes.
Stew about two dozen large prunes; when cold remove stones. Take the same amount of almonds, blanch and brown them; put one almond in each prune. Take one-half cupful of gelatin and put over it just enough water to cover. Heat the juice of prunes and measure out one pint and pour over gelatin; have the juice boiling hot. Add one-half cupful of sugar and the juice of three lemons; strain and pour over prunes. Put this in a mold and when served cut a piece from the center and fill with whipped cream, or use for a salad with mayonnaise dressing.

Meat Patties.
Take a pound or so of fresh round steak, cut off the fat and run through meat chopper. Separate into small patties and in the center of each place a pinch of salt and small pinch of pepper, if

fond of onions a small shred of onion also. Fold the meat over so that seasoning is in center. Dip each patty into beaten egg, which also has been seasoned, then cracker crumbs and fry in hot fat until nice and brown on both sides. Garnish with parsley.

Chocolate Pie.
Line a deep plate with pie crust, pricking several holes in same with steel fork, and bake in moderate oven.
Filling for pie—Beat the yolk of one egg and one-half cupful sugar together, add one square of chocolate, grated, heat one pint milk in double boiler and add to it the egg, sugar, chocolate and two and one-half tablespoonfuls of cornstarch dissolved in a little cold milk, and stir constantly. When sufficiently cooked remove from fire, add one teaspoonful of vanilla and pour into the crust. When cold cover with whipped cream.

Cranberry Jelly.
One quart of cranberries, one pint of sugar, one pint of water. Wash and drain berries and add the water. Let come to boil quickly, mash and add the sugar. Boil again and steadily for fifteen minutes, stirring often. Mash through a colander or puree strainer and set away to cool. This makes three or four glasses.

Meat Loaf.
Almost any meat may be used successfully in a meat loaf, provided there is some fat, bread and egg to bind the ground meat together. A very nice loaf can be fashioned from stewed lamb ground, a slice or two of stale bread, soaked in milk, a beaten egg, some herb seasoning, salt and pepper. A brown or tomato gravy should be served with meat loaf when the dish is to be used hot as a dinner meat. Be particular to garnish the loaf neatly.
