STATE HOLDS TITLE TO ITS POWER SITES

ated and applied to a beneficial use. When it ceases to be used for that purpose, the rights of the applicant are at an end. The state at no time parts with the title to the water, but simply confers upon the appropriator the right to the use for the purpose designated in the

Fixing Priority of Rights.

The law further provides that if there is no unappropriated water in the source of supply, or if a prior appropriation has been made for the same purpose, the state board shall disapprove the applica-The last legislature passed a law by which it required the State Board of Irrigation to meet and determine the priority of all water rights along the streams of this state, and during the spring and summer of 1912 the board was in session many days, having the whole subject under consideration. The parties interested appeared, through their attorneys, and these matters were fully argued, briefed and considered in open session of the board.

The state board of irrigation has, at never had any power under the law to do so. During the consideration of these matters, the board cancelled a large number of applications under which no work had been done. Prior to 1912, the plication for a permit was performed perfunctorily under the law by the secretary of the board of trrigation.

THIRD SHOE MACHINERY SUIT

Government Files Bill Against Combine at Trenton, N. J.

CHARGE OF MONOPOLY IS MADE

It Asks Termination of Contract Between Big New Jersey Company and Several Other Corporations and Individuals.

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 8.-The federal government made its third anti-trust love against the United Shoe Machinery company in a civil suit filed here today. charging the so-called trust with yielding an alleged monopolistic power and unfair trade tactics to force the Keighley company-a competitor-into an unlawful contract for the leasing, sale and fixing the price of an "in-seam trimming

The United States district court here was asked to terminate the contract under which the Keighley company gave the United Shoe Machinery company the exclusive right to lease to shoe manufacturers the "in-seam trimming machine," the patent of which is held by the Keightley company. The effect of the agreement is declared to be "to perpetrate and extend a monopoly of the shoe machinery industry in the United hoe Machinery company of New Jer-

Following are the defendants in the suit: United Shoe Machinery company, Boston; Keighley company, incorporated; Vineland, N. J. Sidney, W. Winslow, Orieans, Mass.; Edward P. Hudd, Newton, Mass.; Charles Percy Keighley, William Bottomley Keighley and Charles Keighley of Vineland, N. J. Trust is Arraigned.

The government's petition is a severe arraignment of the "trust's" alleged unfair practices. The vigorous enforcement of its methods is declared to have driven practically all competitors from the shoe machinery industry, giving the \$25,000,000 United Shoe Machinery company control of more than 99 per cent of the trade. The big corporation is described by the government as follows in the bill:

By misrepresentation and threats it deprives its competitors of their cusomers. It has threatened its competitors that it will use its enormous resources and powers to take away their customers By threats it has prevented competing concerns from entering the business. It has given rebates to shoe manufacturers to induce them to use exclusively its machines. It has discontinued the sale to shoe manufacturers of all the most impertant machines and unlawfully de vised and put into effect leases and licenses containing unreasonable and oppressive provisions, which agreements shoe manufacturers are compelled to execute in order to obtain machinery with which to equip their factories. The company is accused of acquiring

DAY OF THE GREAT SNEEZE

Fire in Chicago Drug House Presents Unusual Features.

BUILDING IS QUICKLY EMPTIED Firemen Compelled to Work in Relays Because of Strong Fumes from Great Quantity of Smoldering Drug.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8 .- "This year of grace may pass into history as the year of the Great Sneeze, taking rank with the Year of the Great Wind."

The chorus of sneezes was on the first floor of a wholesale drug house in West Lake street. In two minutes the wave of sneezes spread over the second floor, until presently 125 employes, hatless, coatless and ker-chewing explosively, rushed into the street.

Explanation of the outburst was found in the burning of 225 bags of sulphur in the basement. Crowds, attracted by the gongs of the

fire engines, rushed to the scene, but retired, sneezing. The fumes spread to adjoining buildings and their occupants emerged on the street, red-nosed, redeyed and sneezing. Firemen rushed into the basement but

quickly retreated, dragging with them twelve of their number, who had been overcome by the fumes. They, too, were sneezing.

So pungent were the fumes that only one stream of water could be applied to the fire. Those manning this hose were relieved frequently to sneeze the fumes from their lungs. The sulphur burned stubbornly, but finally was extinguished Still sneezing, the firemen returned to
