Sokol Hall at Crete Burned. CRETE, Neb., Feb. 8 .- (Special.) -- Fire destroyed the large Sokol hall at Crete late last evening, and seriously threatened five or six houses that were in the immediate vicinity of the building. The building was doomed before the fire company arrived and nothing could be done, except put out the fires that the flying embers were causing on the roofs of the nearby houses. These embers flew to all parts of town and caused a good deal of anxiety for some time. The building was built entirely of wood and was old and dry, so that it burned like tinder. The insurance on the building was \$1.400 and upon the fixtures \$300, but this is said not to cover the loss sustained. The officers of the Sokol organization seem to be entirely ignorant as to the cause of the fire, but say that they expect to build a \$30,000 building for their gymnasium and opera house in the near future.

Cedar Eluffs Has Electric Lights. CEDAR BLUFFS, Neb., Feb. 8 - (Spe cial.)-Cedar Bluffs turned on electric lights last night. The bonds were voted last summer for a home plant to cost \$6,500. Before work started the Frement Gas and Electric Light company made an offer to supply the town with twentyfour-hour service at a great deal less cost and the city board submitted it to a vote and the Fremont proposition carried by a large majority. The system as it now stands consists of three wires run to Fremont and crossing the Platte river on three steel towers near where the dam of the proposed Kountze brothers power canal will be. Regardless of this section in the constitution, the governor is appointing democrats as heads of state institutions, and at the rate he is going there will be no selections to be made by the non-partisan board of control which he will appoint.
