NEW WAY TO PAY OUT CASH

Government Seeks to Simplify Business Methods.

CHECKS MORE EASILY CASHED

Disbursing Order May Temporarily Withdraw Funds from Some Banks, but Government Says Good Will Result.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(Special Telegram)—In view of the many protests being registered against the recent order of the Treasury department calling upon national banks that are government depositories—and Omaha is in the list—to reduce the amounts they are permitted to receive by remitting the unused balances to the treasury, The Bee correspondent today discussed the whole scope of the order with an official of the treasury who is enthusiastically in favor of the order on the ground that it tends to simplify the business of the department. As a result of the interview the following facts were obtained:

The accounts of the disbursing offices of the government are now kept with the treasurer of the United States in Washington. All checks issued by such officers are drawn on the treasurer and are payable by any assistant treasurer or designated bank depository.

Funds Easy of Access.
Funds are held, however, by all sub-treasuries and bank depositories for the payment of such checks. Instead of restricting the final payment of a check to a particular sub-treasury or bank it will be paid by any one of them and immediately forwarded to the treasurer in Washington, who keeps the accounts of the officer who drew the check.

This plan will keep large amounts of public money in active circulation which under former methods became inactive for considerable periods of time. Under the old plan, money was forwarded by express at government expense by collectors of customs and internal revenue and also by banks to sub-treasuries where the accounts of disbursing officers were opened and kept. Under the new plan a check will be paid and taken up into the government accounts as soon as it reaches a sub-treasury or depository bank. The cash then goes immediately into circulation and no delay will be required to ship the money to a sub-treasury located at a distant point and the check to travel through banking channels to the sub-treasury authorized to pay it.

Redistribution of Funds.
Some redistribution of public funds will be required to adjust conditions to the new order of things. The new plan, however, will bring a check in touch with public funds so speedily that those who were required under the old plan to pay exchange upon their checks will no longer be required to do so.

The record of government transactions shows quite clearly that in the city of Omaha the collections from customs and internal revenue have not been sufficient to pay all government bills presented at the point for payment. For that reason it has been necessary for the government to ship funds to Omaha to cover the balance due on public bills, although the revenue collected there during the last fiscal year exceeded \$3,000,000.

These facts show that Omaha is an important clearing house in the transaction of federal business.

It may become advisable to increase the number of depository banks in certain cities. If there should be one depository bank and an increase of its authorized balance should be needed under the new arrangement, a second national bank might be designated as a depository and supplied with funds sufficient to meet public necessities. An actual test of conditions throughout the country will be necessary to show the permanent requirements of the new plan.

MAUVEAGH MAKES REPLY

Denies Attempt to Embarrass New Administration.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh, in a letter tonight to Representative Carter Glass of the house banking and currency committee, which is investigating Treasury Order No. 5, criticized on the ground that it would result in the accumulation of \$200,000,000 in gold in the New York banks from customs receipts, declared that the new plan of handling receipts and disbursements of the government did not involve an increase in the amount of bank deposits to any appreciable extent.

"The increase will not exceed in the aggregate \$2,000,000 or \$3,000,000, if it reaches that sum," wrote the secretary.

Representative Glass called attention to an article on the new order by Ralph Spivey of California, who charged that the order was put into effect to embarrass the coming democratic administration.

"It is exceedingly doubtful whether a change of this revolutionary character in the business methods of the treasury," said Mr. Glass, "should be put in effect in the closing days of one administration to the possible embarrassment of the succeeding administration."

"Nearly three-fifths of the government's payments are required to be made in New York," said Secretary MacVeagh. "That the government may have facilities to make these larger payments through the banks in New York, the increased balances in that city aggregate \$2,088,000, distributed among twenty-four banks. The total increase in all sub-treasury cities aggregates \$4,823,000. The total increase in all cities aggregates \$6,095,000. Decreases have been made to the extent of \$5,715,000 in the government balances in banks, where the extent of the government business does not justify larger balances than have been left therein. This makes a net increase as stated, of \$380,000 in the banks, the total amount in banks being \$48,700,000 and the adjustments now are practically complete."

KENYON LIQUOR BILL MAY FAIL

Probability Measure Will Strike Snag in Conference.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—(Special Telegram)—Senator Hitchcock stated today that while he was favorable to the general purposes of the Kenyon liquor bill, which restricts its transportation in a "dry state," he believed a more specific definition of the provisions of the bill should be made and he therefore later this evening introduced an amendment to the bill as follows:

Provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be held to constitute a reader illegal or subject to state control the interstate shipment of liquor or liquors above described into any state or territory to an individual for his personal or family use.

After a talk with leaders on both sides of the chamber the conclusion was

reached that the amendment of Senator Hitchcock would be acceptable to Senator Kenyon and if not adopted in the form as presented by Senator Hitchcock that some other form would be used that would mean the same thing.

It would not be at all surprising to see the Kenyon bill pass without a roll call and then thrown into conference it is extremely doubtful if any measure satisfactory to both senate and house conferees would be agreed upon. At this writing the chances of legislation contemplated by the Sheppard-Kenyon bills is extremely doubtful.

Senator Hitchcock, asked if he had any real intention to go abroad in an ambassadorial capacity to round out his career in the public service, said the subject had never entered his mind, that he would look upon a career in the diplomatic service as a "demotion" instead of a "promotion" occupying as he did the exalted position of a United States senator. He thought some good friend in Nebraska was drawing the long bow when a foreign mission was picked out for him.

A special rule for immediate consideration of the Webb bill, prohibiting shipment of liquor into "dry" states was agreed upon tonight by the house rules committee and will be presented tomorrow. The Webb bill is similar to the Kenyon bill, pending in the senate, but it proposes modified restrictions on interstate liquor traffic and would affect only liquor intended for sale.

Senate Republicans Planning Retaliation

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Opposition of democratic senators to the confirmation of President Taft's 1,500 pending nominations has brought some republican senators into the position of threatening retaliation after the democrats come into power on March 4. The proposal is being discussed in the republican cloak rooms, and it was learned today, has been broached in the republican caucus and the executive sessions of the senate.

Senator William Alden Smith of Michigan was the principal speaker in each instance.

In the caucus Senator Smith advocated a policy of obstruction to all nominations by President-elect Wilson. He declared he would be willing to go so far as to oppose the cabinet nominations.

Some republican senators have suggested that opposition to President Wilson's appointments might be used as a means of checking tariff legislation. Senators Root and Lodge and others have spoken against such a plan and expressed especial disapproval of any effort to prevent the confirmation of Mr. Wilson's cabinet nominations.
